Perch a generous bow of white watermarked taffeta ribbon on the left lapel of a black wool crepe tailleur.

Add an all-white hem to the bottom of any printed cotton dress.

Embroider a few red strawberries on a white organdy collar to perk up a navy silk suit. If you can find strawberry buttons all the better.

Scatter a few gold sequins for a border on a white organdy scarf. Tie the whole into a big bow to wear scarf fashion around the neck of a navy wool suit.

Put a brief holero of stiff white satin with a stand-up collar. It's particularly effective over a navy and white striped evening dress.

Edge the cutaway jacket of a black crepe suit with three rows of very narrow gathered white Val lace.

Starch and gather a heavy white lace collar—paper doily effect—for a simple black evening dress. Add stiff white lace mitts if you want to be complete Chanel.

And don't forget that a pique vestee, white raver facings, a string of pearls or a white camellia are perennial "touches of white."
