Union Services Sunday Evenings Setting New Attendance Records

The Sunday evening services at the Civic Auditorium continue to be successful with an average attendance thus far exceeding any previous year in which the inter-denominational devotions have been held here. Next Sunday night Rev. C. M. Northrup will deliver the sermon on "A Full Length Portrait of the Son of God"; St. Andrew's Episcopal church will provide special music and Rev. E. W. Matz, president of the Torrance Ministerial Union, will preside.

Last Sunday's service consisted of congregational singing, music by the First Christian church and a sermon on "The Next Step in Our Civilization" by Rev. Matz, pastor of the Evangelical church. He presented a brief review of transitional periods in the history and called attention to God's use of such periods for special revelations and progress.

"Our next step," he said, "is toward a cross-roads where we will be forced to choose between Christ or chaos. Business reforms are proving that only Christian principles are standing the tests of modern life. Every way of life that is un-Christian is breaking down."

"Our modern life is proving to be successful as those points only where it is Christian in principle," Rev. Matz reminded the union congregation. A new spiritual awakening different from all previous revivals will bring a new sense of appreciation and application of Christ in every day life.
