TESTED RECIPE

ONCE upon a time there dwelt in the fashionable English watering-place of Bath a lady by the homely name of Sally Lunn—also ought to be the patron saint of all folk who gather together for an afternoon visit and refreshment. For she made a famous little tea cake which bears her name. But we're improved Sally's original recipe. Today we make our Sally Lunn more quickly—and more surely, with the aid of double-acting baking powder and cake flour, to give that feathery lightness so essential to hot breads.

Quick Sally Lunn: 2 cups sifted cake flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup butter or other shortening; 4 table-spoons sugar; 1 egg, well beaten; 1 cup milk. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugar, and cream together thoroughly. Combine egg and milk. Add flour to creamed butter and sugar, alternately with milk mixture, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Bake in greased muffin pans in hot oven (425° F.) 25 minutes, or until done. Makes 12.
