Revocation of eight Los Angeles county liquor licenses, suspension of 10 others and denial of 18 applications for licenses has been ordered by the state board of equalization. A license was denied the Border club of Torrance because of asserted misrepresentation of fact in the application.

### Lack of Evidence Gives Mexican Youth Freedom

On motion by the defendant's attorney, the felony charge of negligent homicide was dismissed against Nick Ruelas, 24, Redondo Beach, by City Judge Robert Lessing yesterday for lack of evidence to support the state's claim that Ruelas was driving while intoxicated when his machine turned over and inflicted injuries on his uncle Francisco Ruelas that resulted in the 52-year-old Lomitan's death Nov. 16. Judge Lessing ruled that there was no evidence submitted to show that Ruelas was drunk at the time of the accident although other Mexican youths in the car with him testified he had been drinking some 45 minutes prior to the crash.

### Pueblo Urgently Needs Renovation

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home conditions are similar to those we observed. True, families whatever their nationality have the power to keep themselves clean. But how are you going to keep fresh without baths and bathrooms are at a premium in the Pueblo.

One woman whose house we visited, told us she had lived there for more than 10 years and never had a toilet or bath facilities.

**Offer Poor Protection**  
The garbage collection service is equal to that provided by the city in the rest of Torrance. The back yards are not overly clean and could be vastly improved.

One sewer line was apparently out of order and was allowing stagnant pools to collect under and beside some of the dwellings. Shacks which had received an interior covering of well-boarded floor and were fairly impervious to drafts but there were a number of places whose bare walls allowed too much ventilation.

Knot holes and wide cracks made these dwellings cold even late in the morning. The general trend of reports from Pueblo residents we interviewed indicated a desire for better living conditions—not much improvement but just enough to give them shelter without leaking roofs, solid walls to keep out the cold nights and bathtubs.

**Constant Fire Hazard**  
There is considerable overcrowding families of six or more living in three small rooms. How they pack them in is still a mystery to me but they do it. Kitchens, as such, are almost non-existent. Food preparation is done in either one corner of a living room or else performed in

shed-like additions to the dwelling. Drop lights with one yellowish lamp provide a murky illumination.

Rev. Lingenfelter believes that the Federal Re-Settlement Administration would cooperate in improving Pueblo conditions.

He thinks that if the city council would take direct action, such as authorizing the county department of health to make a survey and recommendations, the single tenement section of Torrance could become nothing but a noisome memory.

**HEALTH OFFICER CITES DANGER FROM HOUSING**  
Claiming poor housing and overcrowding forces them into close contact with tuberculosis, Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, Los Angeles county health officer, has revealed that 25 percent of the active cases of tuberculosis in Los Angeles county area has occurred among Mexicans.

"The incidence of tuberculosis among Mexicans is in no way a reflection upon the character and make-up of the Mexican as a citizen. In many respects we find these persons especially responsive to our public health work, and especially obedient to our rules and regulations. It is the circumstances connected closely with their economic status which tends to force them into poor housing and close contact which makes the spread of the disease so rapid," Dr. Pomeroy declared.

While only seven or eight percent of the population is Mexican, it was shown during the fiscal year 1937-38 that, out of 2,087 new cases of tuberculosis of the lungs, there was a total of 481 Mexicans. Of 562 deaths from tuberculosis during the fiscal year 1937-38 there were 102 Mexicans, or approximately 20 percent. About one half of all the cases developed within three years of their becoming residents of this county.

Another fact Dr. Pomeroy pointed out as being particularly important is the tendency of tuberculosis to spread among persons under 20 years of age, namely children in a Mexican family, where one or another parent is affected. Considering cases for the entire group under 20 years of age, 55 percent of all cases were among Mexicans, it was revealed.

"Marie Antoinette" as it will be revealed at the Plaza theatre in Hawthorne Sunday, is a triumph of the motion picture art. More than that, it is a triumph for Norma Shearer.
