CHINESE ART EXHIBIT AT PALOS VERDES

During the week, Monday thru Friday, the gallery will be open from 2 to 6 in the afternoon. A member of the Art association will be there to greet visitors and explain some of the intricacies of the paintings. There will be no charge.
