G. P. Increases Building to Date to \$1,878,000

Raising its total expenditure at the huge refinery plant from \$4,575 to \$1,878,000 for the year to date, the General Petroleum Corporation took out a building permit this week for the installation of three large tanks, a mixer and a pump. Other building projects were launched by:

W. W. Quinn who is building a steel frame garage structure at 1405 Border for \$2,000; Wey Manufacturing company of Gardena which is erecting an addition of a frame shop structure to its present factory at 17001 Redondo avenue for \$400; George W. Turner of 820 Portola, who is building a five-room frame house costing \$2,000 at 618 Amala, and the Volling Oil company which is erecting a wooden oil derrick at 2021 237th, \$5,000.

Hearing Slated On Lomita Project

A protest hearing on the proposed improvement of 260th street between Cayuga avenue and Appian Way has been set for 10 a. m., Dec. 27, by the board of supervisors following adoption of a resolution of intention to complete the work.

At a cost of \$3,750, the work on 260th would include re-grading of the street and installation of curbs and sidewalks. Plans for cross section of the district to pay for the improvement, recently requested by a majority petition, have been outlined by the supervisors.

—AND TELL OF TIME by Laura Krey: From the final years of the Civil War to the 1890s, from Virginia to Texas, this story sweeps forward with an epic breadth and rhythm.

Cavin Darcy, a soldier in the army, returning through Georgia stops to see his Georgia cousin and persuades one of the them, Lucina, to return with him to Texas. On the rich black land of Texas beside the Brazos river Cavin's father waits his son's return. The story of Cavin and his wife Lucina is a tale of romance and achievement, of happiness gained only after the long uphill fight of a conquered people for their salvation.

LISTEN! THE WIND by Anne Lindbergh: The many thousands of readers of "North to the Orient" will welcome Mrs. Lindbergh's new book. All the charm which one enjoyed in the first book is held in this last, doubly enhanced by the sense of drama. Actually "Listen! The Wind" is the record of the takeoff and flight made by Charles Lindbergh in his first solo flight to Brazil, one of the closing laps in their survey of world air routes. It is the circumstantial account of ten days of waiting for the aid of a moonlight flight across the ocean; at the same time it is an emotional and spiritual adventure.

What the author felt keenly she transcribes vividly, and the pages contain a succession of brilliantly etched scenes given depth and poetry by her reflections upon them. One really marvels at the quality of the book in the fact that the author includes so complete a factual story gracefully contained within an exciting narrative.

Col. Lindbergh's contribution is an introduction, stating briefly the importance of the flight scientifically and characterizing it as a period in aviation which is now gone. At the end of the volume is a list of materials, mechanical equipment and emergency stores, providing a rather interesting project lesson in the great care and skill in engineering upon which real romantic adventures are built.

POWERS IN THE MIST by Elizabeth Goudge: Here is a pleasant literary fairy tale, laid in the fair green fields, among the shrubby splendor of Elizabethan England. We have two boys whom the gypsy changed in their cradles. We meet Bodly, Walter, Raleigh, Sir Phillip Wyndesay and good Queen Bess herself, in the romantic flesh. The tale is distinctly idyllic rather than realistic and has the charm of a sunny, slow summer afternoon.
