Diphtheria Death  
Rate Drops in Co.

The diphtheria death rate in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles county has dropped from 6.6 per 100,000 in 1927 to less than one person in 100,000 in 1937, Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, county health officer, reported this week.

The case rate for this disease also dropped from 178 cases per 100,000 in 1927 to 16.6 per 100,000 ten years later, the health officer reported.
