Reaves Continues Dropping Bills in Legislative Hopper

Assemblyman Fred Reaves of this district had a busy week at the State Legislature in Sacramento, according to a tabulation of more Assembly Bills he introduced.

Most important of his recent measures is a wages and hours bill, No. 203, to "establish as rapidly as possible minimum wage and maximum hour standards at levels consistent with the health, efficiency and general well-being of workers and to increase employment opportunities."

Other measures include: No. 254 which would create a "California Mediation commission, establishing a system of mediation, conciliation, and arbitration for labor disputes"; Nos. 279 and 280 pertaining to the establishment of public parks at Palos Verdes; and No. 70 making an appropriation of \$250,000 to drain and dredge Nigger Slough to ocean as a flood control measure.
