

Merchants Cage Season Starts

First games in the new Merchants Basketball League were run off Tuesday night at the high school gymnasium and the A. & P. Market and Torrance Merchants' quintets emerged as the initial winners, The A. & P. Market team topped the National Home Appliance cagers, 23 to 19, and the Merchants defeated the Lomita Gauchos, 38 to 20.

El Segundo's Oilers turned in the biggest upset of the Marine League basketball season to date on the same day when they handed the high-scoring Banning Pilots their first defeat of the season, 30 to 23. The Pilots continued to lead the League however, Jack Tweedie, Banning ace, was high scorer with 12 points while Dan Barber and George Renfro each tallied 11 points to lead the victors. El Segundo's Bees, who are leading their League trounced the Banning Bees, 24 to 28.

Taking a lead in the opening period, the San Pedro varsity had no difficulty in stopping Gardena 31 to 23 Tuesday. The Pirate lights, however, were forced to an overtime period to defeat the Gardena Bees, 20 to 18.

Banning Wins Twenty-four of Banning's 60 points scored on the Torrance varsity last Friday were netted by Jack Tweedie, forward. The Pilots held the Tartars to 38 points. Held in check slightly during the first period, the Banning five out looked in the final with a wild scoring spree. It was their sixth straight triumph. Marvin Lee, Torrance's top scoring center, accounted for 10 points.
