Reaves to Make Council Race

Assemblyman Fred A. Reaves, who recently obtained nominating petitions as a prospective candidate for the Los Angeles city council, has received official endorsement of several political clubs of the 17th congressional district.

The caucus, he said, was held at Gardena. Delegates voted 14 in favor of the San Pedro legislator, dividing the opposing votes 10 to 4 between two other candidates for the council berth.

Reaves, who is now in his third term at 68th district assemblyman, is expected to file his nominating petitions before the deadline this afternoon.

Door prizes were awarded Saturday evening to Mrs. Marvel Fisher of Redondo Beach, first prize of \$25; Miss L. W. Fraser of Torrance, second prize of \$15; and Ercatone Auto Supply and Services Stores, Torrance, third prize of \$10—half of which was returned to the hospital benefit fund.

The funds raised thus the benefit ball each year are used to purchase new equipment as required in the advancement of medical and surgical science.


