FHA MODERNIZATION LOAN BORROWING TO END JUNE 30

Expiration of the privilege to borrow funds for the purpose of modernization and repair of all types of property through the facilities of the Property Improvement plan of the Federal Housing Administration is scheduled for June 30.

Mayor W. H. Tolson, chairman of the Torrance Better Housing Committee, urges all property owners in need of a liberal financing plan to take advantage of it before that date.

The Property Improvement Plan provides for the insurance of any number of loans to im-

prove any number of properties to a single borrower, if the borrower can show evidence of a good credit standing and an assured income, and provided also that the amount of the loan on any one property does not exceed \$10,000 in amount.

Up to five years is arranged for the repayment of the loan in equal monthly payments.


Former Herald Worker Named Deputy Appraiser

Slight Changes Noted In Party Registrations

Strength of the Townsend party is waning in Los Angeles county, but only slightly, according to the latest figures released this week by Registrar of Voters W. M. Kerr. The party has lost 34 registrations since last Dec. 16, when the names of all persons who did not vote last August or November were cancelled. Largest gains are shown by the Democratic and Republican ranks. Bourbons have gained 1,800 since last December, with the total for the entire county now standing at 694,005. Republicans have gained 320 new registrations, bringing that party's total to 407,584 for the entire county.

Grand Total Is Short
The Townsend party, newest in the state, now has 11,080 members, as compared with 11,114 last December when Kerr's books were cleared of "non-voters."

Hobby Worker Creates Violin of Newspapers

BRACKENRIDGE, Pa. (U.P.)—A violin made of newspapers? It's a fact. And, furthermore, the instrument can produce a fairly good tone.

The violin was built by Jimmy Work, who does that sort of thing as a hobby. Last summer, Work made a violin from match sticks. The newspaper fiddle was built in 47 hours. With the exception of the shank, it is made of papers glued together, with each six layers separated by one layer of sugar sack cloth.

Two-thirds of the Townsend party members are women.
