**'Our Town' Prize Play in L. A.**  
Winner of the 1938 Pulitzer award as the best new play produced in New York this year "Our Town" comes to the Bill; more theatre next Monday night with Frank Craven and the same principal cast that appeared on Broadway and the current tour for the past year.  
Thornton Tilder, who wrote "Our Town," is best known as a novelist. In 1928 he wrote "The Boy of San Luis Rey," the book that won the Pulitzer prize of that year and the award to his play makes him the only writer to win the prize in two departments of literature.  
Craven describes the mythical village of Grover's Corners, New Hampshire, where the action takes place, and introduces the characters as they make their entrances. Members of two families, the Gibbs and the Webbs, supply most of the action. Their heads are respectively, the village doctor and the editor of the local weekly. And they are next door neighbors. George Gibbs and Emily Webb, both in high school, fall in love and are married. Everyday lives of the parents as the children grow along with their villagers, are traced with fine accuracy and it is by this simple device that the author tells the story of all humanity on its march from the cradle to the grave. The spectator has a feeling of sitting at the roadside as civilization marches past.  
Besides Craven, principals of the "Our Town" cast are Marie Scott, Thomas Coley, Ann Shoemaker, Thomas W. Ross, Helen Carew and James Spotswood. Popular matinees will be played on Wednesdays and Saturdays.
