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Pedro Tracksters Have No Trouble Defeating Oilers

In walloping the El Segundo Oilers 82 to 22, the San Pedro varsity track team shattered four meet records, captured 11 of the 12 first places and scored sweeps in the shot put and high jump last Friday afternoon. Jack Thorburn, El Segundo's ace quarter-miler, holder of the Marine League record in that event, set a new meet mark with a sensational 52.4s performance.

The Pirate Bees and Cees found less competition in their events than they expected and sailed to easy triumphs—the B squad winning 65½ to 29½ and the Cees nabbing a 67.1-6 to 75.6 victory.

Sheldon Solloway, Pedro half miler, lowered the mark in that event, winning in 2m. 8.5s. Bob De Rio cut several seconds from the mile mark, winning in 4m. 15s. Jim Banich tossed the shot 19 feet 9 inches to crack the record in that event and Homer Sims high jumped 5 feet 9 inches or a new meet mark.

Banich, San Pedro's "one man track team" who usually cops the 100, 220, shot put and runs the 100 yard dash, was withdrawn from the longer sprint in order that Green, another Pirate, might win points. Banich took the 100 in 10s and the shot out with his record heave. The relay was awarded to San Pedro by forfeit.

Coach Phelan Tries Out Box Shape Huddle

SEATTLE (U.P.)—When the University of Pittsburgh's football team comes west next fall to meet the University of Washington Huskies, it may be confronted with a new type of huddle devised by Coach Jimmy Phelan.

Phelan tested the huddle during spring practice. It resembles a box formation, with the center, guards and tackles lining up behind the position they occupy in scrimmage; the halfbacks and fullbacks forming a second line parallel to the first, and the ends filling in the remaining sides. The quarterback remains out of the huddle until he sizes up the defense, then enters the middle and calls the next play.

The coach said the new system demands efficiency and simplicity, but whether the Huskies will adopt it permanently will depend on the success it has in early season games. Heretofore, the Huskies have employed the conventional circle huddle.

Coach Pete says that Stecker will really go places this year. His running form is nearly perfect, has plenty of fight and a wonderful heart.
