



Rehabilitation Department Said Choked

Time has come for a "show-down" as to what the board of supervisors wants to do with the county rehabilitation department, Manager E. L. Duffy told them this week in a letter outlining how it was being "choked off," with the result that it was performing few services for other county departments.

"Four years of operation has convinced me if the capital equipment of the department of rehabilitation could be operated by county relief clients to practical capacity at all times that it would pay its own way," Duffy stated. "No plant can run on half capacity, because production costs are necessarily greater."

Duffy said that during the winter months when the department should be the busiest, its power sewing equipment was idle 62 percent of the time, its wood working machines 70 percent of the time, and its shoe repair section likewise.

His department has until recently made thousands of denim uniforms for jail inmates at lower cost than they could be bought in the open market.

"It is undeniably true that when the rehabilitation department, using relief clients, can produce articles for county use, that much business is lost by certain private concerns," Duffy said.
