Torrance to Take 11 First Places in League Finals

Tomorrow, Friday, May 19, the date of the Marine League track and field finals, held at Narbonne high school, Lomita—Time 2:00 o'clock.

After several weeks of figuring and watching Pete Zamperini's speedsters turn in several new school records we have come to the conclusion that Torrance will walk away with 11 first places, and several seconds and thirds in the annual "classic" of the local league. So they are: VARSITY

Bill Stewart will take first in the broad jump and high jump. His leap of 22 ft. 5 1/2 in. will establish a new meet record. The old record is 21 ft. 10 in. held by Jack Yamada of Gardena, set in 1936.

Stewart holds the league record in the high jump of 6 ft. 1 1/2 in. set last year. But the Tartar had done 6 ft. 5 1/2 in. this year, and will do over the 6 ft. 3 in. mark tomorrow. Billy is the best high jumper in the entire state of California, and should walk away with the state title this year.

Another first place in the Class A competition is conceded to Blonde John Hall, California's best miler for 1939. Hall will run the four-lap event around 4:30 tomorrow, and will be trying to break Louis Zamperini's league mark of 4:27.2, established in 1935.

Eugene Hatter should be a double winner—His best time in the 660-yard run, 1:28.9 is near the league mark held by Brownlee of San Pedro, 1:27.7. Set last year. Look for Hatter to break this mark. The other event that Eugene will take a first in, will be the 70-yard high hurdles. His best time for this event is 9.3.

Leather-lunged Lee Stecker should break the league record of 3:30.9 held by Nagel of Torrance (1938) in the 1320 yard run. Stecker has hit 3:25.8 this year, and can, if he tries, do around 3:20.

Clifford Trezise, brother of Bobby Trezise, and the first track athlete in the family, will be another double-winner for the Tartars—120-yard low hurdles and high jump. Trezise has run the lows in 14.1 and leaped the bar at 5 ft. 10 in. These are the best in the league for the dual meet season.

Gerald McDonald (freshman) will start the ball rolling for the midgets, when he runs away from the boys in the 660-yard run. Gerald has run 1:30.4 this year. Should break Narbonne's Jack Peck's record set last year in 1:26.5, if he really tries. The Torrance lad has never extended himself, and to my way of thinking is the best class Cee, 660 man in Southern California.

Little Ted Yasunaga should win the 120-yard low hurdles, his best time this year is 14.7, but Kent of Banning will give him the race of his life.

Relay (4x40). This team composed of Wallace Woods, Bill Parton, Bobby Golden and Ted Yasunaga is the best Torrance high has ever presented to the public. They have broken the school record five times this year. And will break Narbonne's league mark of 47.6 tomorrow. The local lads run the lap event in the fast time of 49.9, and may do 46 flat if pushed. They only trouble, and it is bad—they have a hard time passing the baton in the limited amount of space.

America's Best Miler Runs in North Saturday... Louis Zamperini, who holds the distinction of running the fastest mile in the world this year, 49.3 (outdoors), will run the 880 and mile at Seattle next Saturday, May 20. He has run the second fastest two-mile in the entire world (1939). His mark was the best until last Saturday when Greg Rice of Notre Dame ran 9 min. 6.4 sec. for a new American college record. And Louis has also run the fastest 880-yard, turned in this year by a college athlete. Next week he travels to New York for the I.C.A.A.A. meet on May 27.

Records to Fall in Marine Meet Friday

NARBONNE HOST FOR TRACK CLIMAX OF '39 SEASON

All indications pointed today to a scintillating number of athletic performances tomorrow (Friday) afternoon when the finals of the Marine League track and field meet will be staged on Narbonne high school's vastly-improved Griffin Field. One League record was shattered Tuesday in the preliminaries when Bobby LeGaspi of Banning high school tossed the shot 46 ft. 11 in. to eclipse a Leuzinger boy's heave in 1937 by two inches.

A lot more existing records are expected to be tossed aside as the tracksters from Torrance, Narbonne, San Pedro, Banning and El Segundo begin pelting the fast Lomita track at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

That track is being put in perfect condition for the league meet. During the preliminaries Tuesday it was noticed that the path was a bit soft at the north end from excessive watering but that will be improved for the big meet.

Altho most dopsters expect San Pedro to take the varsity and B meets (and some even predict the Pirates will grab the C laurels as well), Narbonne, Banning and Torrance are expected to give a good account of themselves in the Bee and Cee classifications.

Pole vault—Clark (ES) Yoshida (G), Ohara (N), Moore (B) tied for second, Ohe (SP) DeWitt (T) and Stout (ES) tied for fifth. Height: 10 ft. 9 in. High jump—C. Trezise (T); Gilbert (B), Yuhashi (B) and Lisman (SP) tied for second; Riggs (N), Dudley (SP), Farrell (G) and Russell (T), tied for fifth. Height: 5 ft. 8 in.


