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Friends and merchants of this city raised money last week to send high jumping Bill Stewart to compete in the National A.A.U. Track and Field Championships. Stewart did not let his home town and friends down. On Monday, July 3, he tied for second place in the Junior championships, at 6 feet 4 inches... but was disqualified, and knew that he could do better, so he entered the Seniors. July 4th taking another second place with the best jump of his life, 6 feet 7 inches, beating out such men as Dave Abbotson, holder of the world high jumping mark, John Wilson of U. S. C. and many other great high jumpers.

Welcome back to Torrance, Bill Stewart and Louis Zamperini, who have carried the banner of your home town well, and certainly deserve all the praise and credit that is coming to you.

ARE THEIR FACES RED? WE WOULD THINK SO...

July 4th, Lincoln, Nebraska, the best 1500 meter man in the United States took the mark and Blaine Rideout of North Teachers College, Texas, made a monkey out of the three top lads. Namely, Zamperini, Cunningham and Chuck Fenske.

Mr. Rideout, a good man, but not good enough to beat the three "Kings" to the tape—decided the only way to beat Cunningham, Fenske and Zamperini, who have great "kicks" on the last lap, was for him to get so far ahead of them that they would never be able to catch up. Well he did just that little thing.

Taking the lead in the second lap, Rideout jumped into a twenty yard lead, increased it to thirty yards in the third—his "big name" put him on his face—flouring that they, with their "great kicks" would be able to overtake this "smart guy" in the last lap. Well, as everybody knows, there are FOUR LAPEs in a mile or 1500 meter race, and Mr. Rideout ran all four laps, but Cunningham, Fenske and Zamperini only ran the last lap—they gained all but five of their yards back, but lost the race to a lad that certainly OUTFSMARTEd the rest of the field, and deserved to win the United States 1500 meter title, and a trip to Europe.

ZAMPERINI GREATEST IN WORLD—IF...
A few weeks ago Coach John P. Nicholson told this writer that Louis Zamperini was by far the greatest distance runner (mile and two miles) in the world, and he has ever known—but that if he did not change his style of running, he would never earn the credit that is justly his.

By changing his style of running, Coach Nicholson of Notre Dame and one of the greatest track and field coaches in the world meant and said, "Louis lays back too long, depending on his marvelous sprint." He also needs some good distance coaching, and should run his own race, in his own lane, and about everyone else on the track.

He also stated that Chuck Fenske would beat Zamperini when they met this year, if the Torrance lad runs with the other men, and does not go out in front and run his own race. Well Fenske did beat Louis, but was beaten himself, by a smarter runner, Chuck Fenske took second, Louis Zamperini was third, with Glenn Cunningham fourth.

"PLA-A-A-Y BA-A-A-L!" TITLE AT STAKE...
I'm not going to pick any laurels I may have by picking the winner of the State Baseball Tournament that gets under way at our city park diamond Saturday afternoon. There are too many good semi-pro clubs in the race and there are too many games (35 or 39) to be played before the California championship is decided. But I will predict that you'll see some of the finest ball played here during the month that you've ever witnessed.

Price of the duets is low enough (two-bits for adults and young folks over 15—those under can get in free) to permit you fans to take up a flock of those games that will be played every night in the week with double-headers tossed in for Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

With teams coming from as far away as Fresno Beach, El Centro and March Field, the Torrance takes on more than a local atmosphere. Other towns sending clubs here are San Fernando (Illinois Cleaners), Glendora, Pasadena, Inglewood (North American Aviation), Hermosa Beach (Nat'l Youth Administration) and San Pedro, which has three teams in the race—Longshoremen, Jadrans and Ft. MacArthur.

MAY BE REGULAR ANNUAL EVENT
I'm told that if the Tournament is a success here this year—financially as well as sportly—Torrance can get it for several years to come. Certainly we've got the facilities for staging such a major sports attraction—a splendid field, top-notch lighting, a good director—Dale Riley—and the Chamber of Commerce did not waste any time grabbing off the 1939 meet.

There's been a lot of publicity given the games in other papers which should make it known to sports fans but you folks right here in town can help a lot on that end by "talking it up" among your friends. Tell them about the State Tour-

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In his first "big meet" Bill Stewart, Torrance high grad in June, outscored his fellow-townsmen Louis Zamperini in the Amateur Athletic Union track and field meet at Lincoln, Neb., Monday and Tuesday.

Stewart, who will enter U.S.C. in the fall, tied with Joe Batiste, Tucson, Ariz., for second place in the Junior division high jump and on the following day was awarded second in the Senior division leap event.

First place in both divisions was taken by Les Steers of the San Francisco Olympic Club who soared 6ft. 7 3/4 in., in the Junior meet and went 6ft. 8 3/4 in., in the Senior division.

Zamperini outsmarted The Torrance boy jumped 6ft. 4 in., to tie with Batiste in the Junior meet and then made the best leap of his life in clearing 6ft. 7 in., in the Senior division. He was given second place in the major competition because of fewer number of tries, according to reports from Lincoln.

Zamperini, running for the Southern California Athletic Association closed fast to nip Glenn Cunningham out of third place. But he had been outsmarted by Blaine Rideout of the Shore Athletic club (Elton, N. J.), who pulled the big surprise of the afternoon by winning the much-talked-of 1500-meter run. Charles (Chuck) Fenske was second.

Rideout won in the fair time of 3m. 51.5s. He took an early lead from which he was never headed altho he was almost caught by Fenske in the stretch. Reports from the meet indicated that Zamperini, Fenske, Cunningham and company were caught "flat-footed" by Rideout's fast take-off and steady pace thru-out the remainder of the race.
