### County Probing Humane Contract

Investigation of a contract made by the county with the South Bay Humane Society has revealed that Doyle Davison, president of the society, is an employee of County Poundmaster C. O. Harvey while his wife is secretary-treasurer of the society, from which she receives a salary of \$20 weekly, according to Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer of the county. Allen recommended that the contract be held up until further investigation had revealed whether or not there was any bias in rejecting the contract with the Long Beach Humane Society and substituting that with the South Bay society.

The city of Torrance recently renewed its contract with the South Bay humane organization to provide pound service here. The society receives all dog license fees and pound collections for its work in keeping the city cleared of unwanted animals.

Monday Mrs. Meng returned to Red Oak, accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Helene Dalton of Los Angeles. At her home place the funeral for the ninth of her 12 children took place today. Five of her children have passed away in the last four years.

### "Trailer Vagabond" Tours Niagara Falls, New York

From Colorado to New York state is rather a long jump to make for a reporter who is supposed to cover the points of interest in each state. However, many inquiries regarding the World's Fair at New York, as to prices, hotel accommodations, etc., are responsible and later we will cover the points of interest we missed enroute. But first, let's take a look at one of the most popular resorts in the United States and the largest waterfalls in the world in yearly volume of water.

The Niagara River is 36 miles long, running from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario. In this 36 miles it has a fall of 336 feet. From Lake Erie to the Rapids, a normal river winding its way thru the hills. Then suddenly a down grade at the rapids and the

water starting to pick up speed, leaping from rock to rock until the entire surface is lashed into white foam. Then over the falls in a mighty rush to fall on the rocks 186 feet below with a roar that can be heard for over a mile. Clouds of mist arise from the bottom and out of them comes the river again to follow its more peaceful route on to Lake Ontario.

#### A Thrilling Experience

Dividing the river at the "Falls" is Goat Island. This can be reached by a bridge from the American side of the river and from its many vantage points it is possible to see both the American Falls on our side and Horseshoe Falls on the Canadian side. Here, also, is the starting point of the most spectacular sight of all a trip to the bottom and "The Cave of the Winds."

After changing into a suit of water-proof garments, a guide escorts you to the elevator which takes you to the base of the cliff. Over the boulders, at this point, narrow foot bridges have been built which wind their way from rock to rock until you are directly in front of the falls and at one point only 25 feet distant. As 58,000 barrels of water go over the falls each second, you know it is sure to be a real sensation to have it drop 186 feet and almost into your face. From this point another foot bridge takes you to Hurricane Deck, a platform built directly in front of the Cave of the Winds behind the Central or Bridal Veil Falls. This cave is the largest natural opening, back of a waterfall, in the world to the entrance of which visitors are conducted.

In a normal year over 2,500,000 people visit the "Falls." This year, due to the fair, over 4,000,000 are expected.

#### To Make Study

Most of the communities, he said, are extending their sewer lines as WPA projects. Burbank has established a "revolving sewer fund" to assist its sewer work. Property owners in the districts benefited by the lines are then charged about \$1 a foot.

The actual cost, because of the WPA assistance, is only about 50 cents a foot, thus the sewer fund is constantly replenished and ready to back the city in undertaking additional extensions.

It was the consensus of the group that such a "revolving sewer fund" could be established here and the lines extended to Vista Highlands with the aid of a WPA project. Further investigation of the Burbank plan and other sewer extension procedures will be made by a committee composed of Howard P. Raymond, Joel Hagberg, G. E. Harris and Leonard Young.

"I fully realize that the Chamber of Commerce will no doubt be subjected to some criticism for not approving all requests for appropriations, but we must all realize that we are spending tax money which has been contributed by all local property owners and unless the promotion or advertising proposed is of city-wide benefit or has definite recognized advertising value, we have no valid right to recommend the expenditure of tax money for it. Personal sentiment and politics must not be allowed to alter our attitude in endorsing appropriations of public funds," President Smith concluded.
