Only 26 Children Will Be Examined Each Month Here

Mothers Educational Center, a project of Torrance Woman's club financed by the Chamber of Commerce, Community Service association, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, has become one of the city's most valuable enterprises, according to Mrs. Maude Lock, chairman of the center.

The center meets the fourth Friday of each month in the Woman's clubhouse, 1442 Engracia avenue, from 9 to 11 a. m. Here mothers may bring children between ages of one month and six years for check-up on weight, diet and problems of child care.

Local clubwomen register and weigh the children and Dr. Maude Wilde, founder of the center thru-out Los Angeles county, makes the final check-up. Children in need of medical care are referred to family physicians.

New Members Named
Thirty-nine children were registered at the center last Friday, necessitating some being turned away. For this reason, Mrs. Lock suggests the following schedule:

Children between the ages of one to 12 months will be checked monthly; between the ages of two and three years, every two months; between the ages of three months and children from three to six years, every fourth month. Only 26 children will be examined in any one month.
