


Nine Patients Enter Hospital

Narbonne Shop Bids Submitted

Bids for construction of a two-unit shop building at Narbonne high school were received late last week by the Los Angeles board of education with C. E. Bagnall, contractor, submitting the low offer of \$13,995.

Bids ranged from that figure to \$17,907. In all, 15 bids were submitted. Bagnall was awarded the contract, which specifies completion within 90 days. The building will be of frame and stucco construction, 60 feet square with a concrete floor and will follow the Narbonne architectural style.

Wood and electric shops will be housed in the new two-unit structure, permitting enlargement of the auto shop in buildings now occupied by these classes. The new building will be located west of the present shop building and north of the boys' gymnasium. Present equipment will be replaced with senior high school type appliances, according to Principal John L. Abbott. An increase in shop teaching personnel is also planned.

European Scene Changes So Fast Even Prophecies Are Behind Time

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Changes are occurring so fast in Europe that even a prophet "can't keep up with his own predictions," admits John S. Martin, one of the founders and editors of Time Magazine.

Prophecies made by Martin last year in a book he wrote, called "General Manpower," included: "Stop Hitler" movement forecast for 1946; annexation of Czechoslovakia, 1943; extension of Italian influence across the Balkans through Yugoslavia and Bulgaria into Greece as a result of "the Greek revolution of 1940"; and the Communist conquest of Asia, 1951.

In "General Manpower," Martin gave this world picture 20 years hence: Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. (now senator), President of the United States; Queen Elizabeth (now 13-year-old Princess Elizabeth) on the British throne; Queen Juliana reigning over the Dutch possessions, and Benito Mussolini "still going strong."

Martin's prophecy concerning Adolf Hitler was that he was driven insane in 1943 by Britain and France checkmating his expansion plans. The fuhrer supposedly retired to his mountain home, "appearing occasionally to the German people in a holy golden mist of television."

Martin visualized India as "independent but still in the British orbit." The date set for a conquest of Asia, absorbing Japan, China and Slam into an Asian-

Soviet Union Empire established over China when the war between the two countries finally ends was 1951.

"Then," said Martin, "the Western Powers are faced with the basic issue of the world, the ultimate battle between the East and the West, the struggle between the mass-minded men and the individualists."

Wars of 1958, in Martin's book, are fought by a mercenary army of American supermen, developed to bodily perfection by physical culture methods and leased out on a contract basis to foreign nations, so that the warring nation's own civilian population need not be drained or even disturbed. When not hired out for war, the supermen of General Manpower, Inc., perform heavy industry's basic tasks on a contract basis. All the workers are shareholders in profitable, wealthy General Manpower, Inc.
