### HEALTH PRECAUTIONS FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN LISTED

Altho the county is still in the midst of a seasonal increase in cases of poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), the county health department advised these "suit-

able precautions" for all school principals, teachers, physicians and nurses:  
1. Give special attention to general cleanliness and sanitation in and about school buildings, with extermination of flies and careful sterilization of eating and drinking utensils, no person to engage in food preparation or cafeteria services unless evidence of freedom from communicable disease is certified by local health officer.  
2. Check on personal cleanliness of the pupils, seeing that they wash their hands frequently and especially before eating.  
3. Give careful supervision to the pupils' physical activities to guard against fatigue.  
4. Carefully inspect all pupils as soon as school opens each morning.  
5. Send home immediately

all pupils with signs of a cold, sore throat, fever, gastro-intestinal upset or any other indisposition.  
6. Home follow-up of all absentees by the school nurse, who should urge the parents to call a physician in case she finds a child who is really ill. (Budget limitations have reduced personnel so much that the health department is unable to follow up cases unless there are definite signs of communicable disease.)

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
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### SHOP TALK

### New Law Gives Protection to Mortgage Holders

Creditors of businesses offered for sale or encumbered under chattel mortgage are now given added protection under Amendments to Section 3440 of the Civil Code, which are now in effect and which apply to all business sales or chattel mortgage transactions completed on and after Sept. 19. The new law requires in addition to recording for seven days publication for at least two days in a newspaper in the township of a copy of the Notice of Intention to Sell or Chattel Mortgage.

Business opportunities brokers who are specializing in the sale of business, auctioneers, and estate officers of banks and title companies, and money-lending concerns, as well as attorneys, are recommending to clients that the sole protection of buyers of businesses or stocks of merchandise and of lenders under chattel mortgages on stocks of merchandise, from the creditors of the seller or the buyer, lies in strict compliance with the recording and publication requirements of the Bulk Sales Law.

### Herald is Cooperating

They also point out to sellers of businesses or borrowers under chattel mortgages, that they are subject to suits for fraud in the event of their failure to comply with the new law.

The Torrance Herald is cooperating with the county recorder in furnishing blank forms to attorneys and others interested in the proper handling of business sales escrows, and through its clearing house, the Los Angeles Newspaper Service Bureau, Inc., at First and Broadway, Los Angeles, equipped to place publications in the proper newspaper and file notices with the correct county recorders throughout California.


