And they said unto him, Yesterday at the seventh hour the fever left him. So the father knew that it was at the same hour, in the which Jesus said unto him, Thy son liveth; and himself believed, and his whole house." Among the selections from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy are the statements: "Mentally in that harmony is the fact and that sickness is a temporal dream. Realize the presence of health and the fact of harmonious being, and the body corresponds with the normal conditions of health and harmony."
