

THE YOUNG COSIMA by Henry H. Richardson: Fiction seldom carries a more dramatic tale than the triangle which involved Cosima Liszt, Hans Von Bulow and Richard Wagner. In the hands of a most gifted writer this immortal story becomes one of the most important novels; one of those true stories more strange and fascinating than most novelists invent.
