

# ALL-STARS MEET GIANTS AT TORRANCE PARK THURSDAY

Baseball fans from all parts of the Harbor district are expected to top off their Thanksgiving holiday dinner by attending what is expected to be a stellar baseball game Thursday night at the Torrance city park diamond.

This will be a major league encounter between Steve Mesner's All-Stars, players destined to make good in the big-time ball circuit, and the barnstorming Royal Colored Giants from Philadelphia. The game will start at 7:30 o'clock at the Torrance park and admission is 35 cents for adults. Youngsters will be admitted free, according to Johnny Angel, Pacific Coast scout for the Cleveland Indians, who is arranging the show.

The line-up for the All-Stars will be: Larry Barton, Sacramento Coast League, first base; Jerry Fridly, Kansas City, Am. Assn., second base; Steve Mesner, formerly of Los Angeles and now signed with the Chicago Cubs, third base; Bob Lemon, New Orleans club, shortstop; Ralph Rhein, San Antonio, Texas League; Del Jones, leading hitter of the Three I League this year; Louie Novikoff, leading hitter of that fast circuit in 1938, and Lin Storti, Minneapolis, Am. Assn., in the outfield; D. C. Moore, Indianapolis, Am. Assn., catcher, and John Lindel, Newark, International League, and Pete Darrow, Hollywood, Coast League, pitchers.

These boys are mostly former high school stars from South Los Angeles who have made good with various clubs this year. Jerry Fridly and Del Jones are moving up to the Cleveland Indians next spring. The "Mad Russian," Louis Novikoff was the sensation of the Coast League this year. Bob Lemon is a Long Beach boy who jumped in at New Orleans and finished this season with a good record. The touring Negro team from Philadelphia is rated as the best colored club in the country today.

## Marine Students Dance Wednesday at Torrance Aud

Determined to prove they can act like ladies and gentlemen even if their fellow-students in other Los Angeles city high schools have endangered interschool games and social functions by their rowdiness, between 500 and 600 young people from the five Marine League high schools will dance at the Torrance Civic Auditorium Wednesday night.

The affair is known as the Marine League Good Sportsmanship dance and Don Briggs and his 15-piece swing band will provide "hot licks" for the young swingers. Narbonne high school expects to have between 150 and 300 boys and girls present while Torrance, San Pedro, Banning and Gardena highs will swell the attendance.

## State Closing Border Stations

Motorists entering California beginning Dec. 1 will not be confronted by the familiar department of motor vehicles inspectors charged with checking automobiles and issuance of non-resident permits.

In line with a drastic economy program necessitated by department budget reductions," said Howard R. Philbrick, director of motor vehicles, "all border checking stations must be closed Nov. 30. An estimated savings to taxpayers of \$75,000 annually in the department's opinion, justifies abandonment of the expensive and frequently criticized service which some motorists consider an annoyance following mandatory border inspection of automobiles by department of agriculture agents."

## Segundo Faces Marine League Basketball Ban

Following criticism of El Segundo high's participation in post and pre-season basketball games, the Marine League officials decided Monday morning to refer the Oilers' infraction of rules to the athletic policy-determining committee of the Los Angeles city schools. El Segundo was found guilty, at the Marine session conducted in Principal Thomas Elson's office at Torrance high, of playing a post-season game with Inglewood at a carnival last winter and jumping the gun this spring by playing Dorsey high before the practice period opened.

The Oilers can be declared ineligible to participate in Marine League games starting Dec. 1, they can play and their games will not count in Marine standings or they can be reprimanded and then reinstated, Principal Elson said. The latter decision will probably be made by the policy-determining body.

It was decided that admission prices for Marine varsity basketball games will be 10 cents with free admission to the Bee and Gee games. Narbonne was represented at the session by Principal John L. Abbott, Charles E. Sutcliffe and Coach Wayne Schloss. The Torrance representatives were Principal Elson and Coach Pete Zamperini.

## Jobless Workers Urged to File Claims At Once

Unemployed workers who earn between \$156 and \$300 per year were urged to file unemployment insurance claims before Dec. 1, 1939. This announcement was made by John F. Chambers,

Oakland, member of the California Employment Commission representing labor. Chambers said that under provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act effective Dec. 1, minimum earnings required before the Commission will pay a claim are \$300 in the base period, which for this quarter, is from July 1, 1938 to July 1, 1939. Until Dec. 1, a worker may have earned \$156 in the base period, and still be entitled to minimum
