

Narbonne and Torrance Bow to San Pedro and Segundo

Narbonne Leads In All-Marine Selections Named by Board

All five Marine League grid coaches didn't have to look much farther than Narbonne high school to pick the All-Marine football honor squad for the All-Southern California Board of Football. In addition to putting five Gauchos on the All-Marine eleven, the coaches tabbed three more for the second team and gave Bob Beckley honorable mention for his work at end. That makes nine Narbonne players to receive recognition—the most in years. Narbonne won the league grid championship this year.

The All-Marine Gauchos are Gus Kroesen, end; Driscoll Truitt, tackle; William Wada, guard; Henry Binkley, quarterback; and Harry Hagedorn, halfback. Those on the second team are Jack Hollar, tackle; Dale Cloud, center; and Milo Roberts, quarterback.

Banning placed three players on the All-Marine and four received honorable mention. San Pedro and Gardena each had two griders named for top honors and two more for honorable mention. Torrance, last year's Marine champion, had loser of every game this fall, failed to get a player on the All-Marine, had its Ner Rathbun, tackle, named on the second string. Bill Darling, guard, and Kenneth Perkin, quarterback were given honorable mention with the latter being tabbed as a blocker.

VICTORS LAST FRIDAY LOOK LIKE POTENTIAL CHAMPIONS

Altho the period of hoop hysterics in Marine League high schools is still very, very young, it looks as the San Pedro's Pirates and El Segundo's Oilers are the fair-haired lads in the short pants. The Pirates eked out their second league victory over Torrance high last Friday in an overtime game that ended 25 to 23 while the Oilers took a 34 to 19 triumph over Narbonne.

El Segundo was making its first start last week, their original debut having been delayed by Coach Mark Sampson of Banning who declined to send his Pilots against the Oilers when the season officially opened because of El Segundo's uncertain status in the league. The Oilers were permitted to remain in the circuit and gave evidence last Friday they will be a team to watch come title time.

An improved Torrance quintet came within a hairsbreadth of breaking San Pedro's proud record of no defeats on their home court last week. The game was sprinkled with spectacular shooting by the Pirates' brilliant forward, Mickey Panovich. He sank a shot from far out on the court. The Tartars presented a much stronger defense than they did the week previous when Narbonne defeated them. As result Panovich, who scored 12 points, was forced to do his tossing from the center of the court.

Gauchos Outclassed

The Tartar offense was sparked by Bob Yancy and Marvin Lee. Yancy collected eight points while Lee was responsible for seven. Bob sank some beautiful shots, dropping baskets without touching the rim from outside the San Pedro defense. The Torrance Bees also lost their game by the margin of one basket, 16 to 14. Both Lee quintets presented air-tight defenses which kept the scoring down.

Narbonne's battle with El Segundo was a battle altho Coach Schloss's Gauchos were outclassed by the fighting Oilers. At half time Segundo held a 17 to 8 lead. Bob Neill, Oiler center, was high point man for the afternoon, getting 12 markers. In the Class B preliminary, Narbonne overwhelmed Segundo 21 to 9.


