

### Tartar Prospects 50-50 in Track and Baseball

Short-pantied youths are dashing hither and yon, other kids are exhorting one another to "put 'er down th' groove, he can't hit it!" and spring is definitely in the air. . . . All of which means that track and field sports plus the grand old American game of baseball have once more entered the high school spotlight.

The advent of baseball finds Coach Robert Barr of Torrance high school feeling very comfortable. In fact he is so comfortable about the Tartars' prospects on the diamond that he looks something like a cat that's just lapped up a pint of cream. But his confrere at the Torrance institution, Coach Pete Zamperini, is in no mood to be trifled with. Still smarting from the licks his basketball team suffered, Zamperini is not anticipating much if anything from the 1940 edition of a Tartar track and field team.

**20 Out for Baseball**  
So much for the outward appearance of the Torrance mentors. Now, how do they get that way? Well, Coach Barr is highly pleased with his baseball prospects. For pitchers he's got Jimmy Daniels, who won his letter at second base last year and looks like a good twirler this coming season; Leroy Richardson, who possesses a remarkably fast ball; Bill Bosche, Bob Fulton, Harold Jackson and Clair Johnson. The latter pair played first and third last year and may be switched to the infield as the season progresses.

For catchers, the Tartar tribe has Bill Hicks, a letterman; Roland Justice and Ralph Pina. Harold Jackson is due to perform at first when he is not pitching, Fred Hicks, playing a much improved second base; Clair Johnson, tabbed for third, and Captain Briganti, the most outstanding player of the team, holding down the third sack.

The outfield can be chosen from a line-up that includes Roland Andrews and Ed Orr, lettermen; Ben Prime, Wallace Woods, Bob Lewellen, Tom Justice, Claude Gottis and Velko Miletich.

This afternoon the Tartar nine is playing a practice game at Venice and on Friday, Feb. 16, the team will meet University high in the first game of the Dorsey high invitational tourney. The first league game is tentatively scheduled for March 1 and the Tartars will practice and play all their games at the city park diamond. The League is expected to run a double round because El Segundo has no ball club.

**Slim Track Material**  
So much for joy and gladness—now let's wipe away a tear with Coach Pete Zamperini: His varsity track and field squad can easily be tabbed on one hand with the thumb missing and his Class B squad has hope but not much else. Zamperini is counting on Cliff Trezise in both hurdles and high jump, Charlie Grubb, who may throw his weight and the shot around for a few points; Leroy Richardson who, if Barr doesn't grab him off for a pitcher, should do something in the sprints; Ormsby Miller, up from the Bees for the 220, and Richard Pierson, distance runner who failed to place in the league meet last year but gives promise this season. Eighteen points, scored in the postponed Banning-El Segundo game, gave the lanky Pilot forward the necessary digits to nose off Dorsey high's Jack Garland for top spot in the list of city high school basketsters.

Frey amassed 198 points in 10 Marine League games for an average of 19.4 points per game. Garland hit the hoop for 193 points in 10 Western League games, averaging 19.3 per fracas.
