Pier, facing the lovely marine gardens across the lagoon at the rear of the auditorium, where the choristers, musicians and other participants in the service will be seated with a large convex shell as an enhancing background. Sound amplifiers will aid the crowd to hear the service.

Guided by a light atop the cross erected on the hill south of WALTERIA, worshippers will make their way from WALTERIA to a spot where they will be able to see the first rays of the sun light up the green hills and bring glowing colors to the long stretch of ocean back of the cross.

Rev. Charlotte Shook of the WALTERIA Full Gospel church and Rev. Joseph Nash of the WALTERIA Baptist church are planning the service which will be for all members of the community.

Other dawn services are to be held at Hollywood Bowl where Kenny Baker, radio and screen singer, will be soloist and at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale where Dr. Rufus B. von KleinSmid will deliver the message. William Farnum will read "The Master Is Coming" and Helen Jepson, Metropolitan Opera star, will sing.

A new sunrise service will be held under the auspices of the Harbor Region Ministerial Association on Mount San Pedro, at 5:51 a. m. Mt. San Pedro is the crest of the Palos Verdes hills, with an elevation of 1482 feet, affording magnificent marine panoramas overlooking the U. S. fleet anchorage, the coast line to the south toward Long Beach and Newport, across the Santa Catalina channel, as well as to the north covering the coast line running to Malibu and the Ventura county line.

The military band of the U. S. Army, 63rd regiment, Coast Artillery, will be featured. Reverend Ralph Cobb, president of the Harbor Region Ministerial Association, will preside and the Easter message will be given by Dr. Charles S. Poling, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Long Beach.

Sunrise services at Roosevelt Memorial Park, 182nd and Vermont avenue, will begin at 5:50 a. m., with a call to worship by the Boy Scouts, to the accompaniment of Marion Wyma at the console of the world's mightiest pipe organ. A splendid choir of mixed voices under the leadership of Rev. James Dayen will sing the joyous hymns of Eastertide. Rev. Ruth Jones will lead the throng in Easter songs and Rev. Milton Smits will deliver the Easter sermon. Benediction by Rev. Ben Griffith will close the service.

The first Easter sunrise service, instituted by Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Miller and Jacob Riis and held on Riverside's Mt. Rubidoux in 1909 was planned as a simple sunrise devotional and not intended to take the place of regular Easter services.

Easter morning services will again be held on that mountain top with the same simplicity that characterized the first service. There will be no sermon, the service is strictly non-sectarian and pastors, whose credits may differ greatly, will offer the invocation and benediction.

Responsive reading by the vast congregation, singing by a combined choir and the reading of Van Dyke's "God of the Open Air" comprises the program.

Inspiring Sight At 5:50 a. m. trumpeters from a rock above the cross will play the Holy City announcing the dawn and in another hour the service will be over and hundreds of people will walk beneath the drooping pepper boughs at the foot of the mountain on their way home.

From midnight on worshippers climb the trails, lighting their way by flashlights. All is dark except for the twinkling lights of the city below.

But when the descent is made the glorious sun has climbed above the rocky points of Box Springs mountain east of Riverside revealing the gold and white and glossy green of orange groves and glorious roses and flowering shrubs of the city that from the first has regarded beauty as a necessity.
