Carson Due for Two Major Improvements

Carson street, which this week gained a new food market center known as the Carsonmart between Cabrillo and Andreo, is certain to bear even greater traffic in the near future than it does now.

Two proposed improvements at either end of that street are definitely a boon to that arterial highway. One is the contemplated re-routing of Carson thru the small extension of El Prado park to eliminate the sharp jogs at El Prado and Manuel avenue.

DRAFTING PLANS
The bridge is the construction of the other over the Long Beach flood control channel which would continue the highway thru to Long Beach boulevard and thence east on Carson to Orange county city.

City Engineer Leonard Young is already at work drafting tentative plans for the re-routing of Carson thru El Prado park by way of a double lane diagonal and various improvement associations are supporting the project for the construction of the connecting bridge in Long Beach.

County to Tax Milk Dealers

More small businesses throughout unincorporated county area will feel the pinch of taxation when several ordinances just adopted by the board of supervisors levying a tax on them becomes effective in 30 days.

Chief among these latest small businesses to be taxed are those having to do with the production and handling of milk. Hereafter such dealers will be required to obtain a license at a \$5 per year fee.

"Every person who is engaged in the business of producing, storing or bottling milk shall procure a license and pay a fee of \$5 per year," the ordinance reads.
