Only 520 Land Parcels Are Tax Deeded In City

Torrance has a total of 520 parcels of property deeded to the state for non-payment of taxes up to the end of 1934, according to a survey made by Howard L. Byram, county tax collector. The survey was made at the direction of the board of supervisors.

Assessed valuation of the 520 parcels was given as \$169,950, which is a small fraction of the city's total assessed valuation of approximately \$20,000,000.

Torrance is in a more enviable position than Compton, for instance, which has 1,873 parcels tax-deeded up to the end of 1934, representing a total valuation of \$321,190, according to Byram's survey.

In Torrance, only 18 of the 520 parcels were improved, representing a total valuation of \$15,695 for the land, and only \$3,770 for the improvements, a total of \$19,465.

In point of percentage, the 520 parcels in Torrance represents but 0.053 percent—a trifle more than one-half of one percent—of the 98,616 parcels tax-deeded in the entire county up to the end of 1934.

Jess Quayle Home From Tour With Indian's Show

Jess Quayle, former local butcher, has returned to his home in Huntington Park after a tour of Texas and New Mexico as a member of Chief Lone Eagle's wild west troupe. Quayle demonstrated big game shooting with a bow and arrow during the tour.

Unlike some sideshow acts, however, he was not just a stunt, according to his brother, Russell, who also is employed as a butcher here. Jess is among the exclusive clan of sportsmen who still prefer the bow and arrow to firearms for hunting.

The former Torrance resident took up archery as a hobby while living here and has won several contests in addition to gaining attention for his Indian hunting exploits.

Drs. Harrison and Laughon In Joint Offices

Dr. W. I. Laughon, physician and surgeon, this week moved his offices from the second floor at 1337 El Prado to a ground floor location at 1339 Post avenue, where he will share the building occupied by Dr. W. During the past month workmen have been engaged in enlarging and remodeling the professional offices at 1339 Post avenue, next to the public library, to accommodate the growing practices of the Doctors Harrison and Laughon. Besides a reception room and private offices for each physician, the building includes a minor surgical room, three treatment rooms for patients, and X-ray room. A number of electro-therapy and modern diagnostic machines have been added to the well-equipped offices.
