Automobile registrations in the state showed an increase this year of 4.05 percent compared with 1939, the state department of motor vehicles announced today.

The increase as of Feb. 1 was 64,346 motor vehicles of all types, with 1,654,661 registered in comparison with 1,598,661 at the same time in 1939. Of the increased number, 53,316 were passenger cars.



## GOLD TROPHY FOR SEMI-PRO BALL TOURNEY RECEIVED

The beautiful gold trophy which will be awarded the team winning the 1940 California Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament at the Torrance city park in July was received this week by Dale Riley, Torrance recreation director, who is state semi-pro baseball commissioner in charge of the fourth annual event.

Standing 26 inches tall, the trophy is surmounted by a ball player ready to smack out a hit while two gold eagles hold the walnut base. On the plaque which is engraved with the name of the donor, the National Semi-Pro Baseball Association, and depicts a map of the United States, California is blocked out in red enamel.

The award is now on display at the Chamber of Commerce. It was sent to Riley by Raymond Dumont of Wichita, Kans., president of the national association. The California tourney will begin at the Torrance city park on July 13 and will continue with games Saturday and Sunday afternoons and every night thru that month.

## Tartar Track Prospects Look Slim This Year

After seeing his 1940 track and field teams in action against Redondo Union high school last Friday in a practice meet, Coach Pete Zamperini is well aware that the going for his Tartar tracksters is going to be pretty tough this spring. Redondo swept thru the three meets (Class A, B and C) without much team opposition from the locals. The first Marine League dual meet is scheduled for April 12 with Narbonne at Torrance.

However the outstanding performance of the afternoon was turned in by Clifford Trease who won the Class A 70-yard high hurdles, 120-yard low hurdles and scaled 6 ft. 3 in. to win the high jump. Bobby Golden was a two-time winner in the Class B division, taking the shotput and high jump. Yasunaga won two Class C events for the Tartars, the 50-yard dash and 120-yard low hurdles and tied with Prowtren for third in the high jump.
