

**Ft. MacArthur Men to Take Part in Fourth Army's Maneuvers**



**"HOW WAR CAME"** by Raymond Gram Swing: America's ace radio news analyst presents his interpretation of events that led to war and the meaning behind them. It will be found quite indispensable for a thorough understanding of the trend of world affairs. John Gunther says: "Exactly what we need. A wonderfully acute and dispassionate examination." Swing's moderation, his avoidance of drama and passionate statement, show up all the better on the scale of these great events.

Clarence Streit's "UNION NOW" is the pioneer presentation of an epoch-making idea that many in the world have been discussing: a world federation of democracies, a union of societies and men as "We, the People of the Atlantic" rather than merely governing bodies. It has been best seller abroad and at home and has aroused comment and action on its seemingly practical peace proposal to bring a war-torn world out of its fatal impasse. According to a recent Gallup poll, the plan has won more than 2,000,000 adherents in the United States—less than a year. The idea itself is not new but far-seeing minds have discussed it. "Ours is an age of imagination and this vision may be just as realistic as the imaginations of Hitler, Mussolini or Lenin—and more practical."

**"THE TREES"** by Conrad Richter is a singularly beautiful and moving book. Over and above the story with its tenseness and excitement is the author's unusually fine interpretation of the essentially simple, natural side of pioneer life. It tells the story of one pioneer family that migrated from Pennsylvania to the virgin wilderness of southeastern Ohio.

Their western migration and struggles are like an epic, and their story is the story of western settlement. The reader will notice perhaps, that same quality of the primitive which characterized "Lamb In His Bosom," one of the early Pulitzer prize winners, and also "The Yearling." One will long remember this novel of the Ohio wilderness and the girl who conquered it.

Earl Bueck has given us a new novel set in both America and the Orient. "OTHER GODS" is the story of how American hero-worship makes gods out of men and of what it does to their wives. The author paints a sympathetic human picture with real characters moving in an absorbing narrative. The book shows a thoughtful study of human emotions and difficulties involved in being one of America's idols.

The American Petroleum Institute reports new reserves containing 12,160,000,000 barrels of oil were discovered in the U. S. production for the first 70 years of the industry.

Amnesty by royal decree freed 9,754 convicts from Italian prisons on the birth of a daughter to Crown Prince Umberto.

Officers and men of Ft. MacArthur's 63rd Coast Artillery, 1,500 strong, will roll their anti-aircraft guns, searchlights and sound-locators from San Pedro in mid-July and head north for Fourth Army exercises in the Ft. Lewis, Wash., area, it was reported this week as the schedule for the war games of all Pacific Coast mobile units was released by Lt. Gen. John D. DeWitt, Ninth Corps area commander, at the Presidio of San Francisco.

Col. Edward A. Stockton of Ft. MacArthur will lead his recently expanded anti-aircraft units on the maneuvers which for nearly 1,000 newly-enlisted men will be their first war games.

The 251st Coast Artillery, anti-aircraft, regiment of the California National Guard, including its San Pedro units, also will join part of the Fort Lewis maneuvers, leaving here about Aug. 4 and returning Aug. 24. The month-long absence of the 63rd regiment will leave only the 3rd Coast Artillery harbor defense regiment at Fort MacArthur.

General DeWitt announced today the regular army and national guard forces will be divided into two groups from Aug. 14 to 17 and will engage in simulated combat.
