Officials Inspect Pueblo Housing

(Continued from Page 1-A) lack of insulating back of stoves.

Some Repairs Made "We agree that the houses are below standard but they cannot be condemned under existing laws," Stansbury told the local officials and Rev. Lingenfelder.

"However, reports that health conditions in the Pueblo are none too good indicate that it would be a benefit to the children of Torrance if a Pueblo school was established in the district. In that way, other children of your city would not come in contact with youngsters from that district."

Some improvement was noted in the Pueblo—some of the houses having been painted recently and Perry Isenstein, who manages the property, was observed repairing one of the stoves. Rev. Lingenfelder observed that the cesspools appear to be operating better as there was no sewage to be seen in the rear of the houses visited.

"Disgrace to City" "I still contend that the Pueblo is a disgrace to the city of Torrance, the veteran pastor and social worker asserted after the inspection. "Perhaps there is nothing we can do to clean up the place but certainly we as a city should not give up trying. Those people want to live in better homes and they show, by their evident efforts to brighten up the shacks they now exist in that they can take care of better places."

Rev. Lingenfelder will make a full report on his observations with the inspecting party at the next meeting of the Torrance Coordinating Council which is also interested in slum clearance.

May Establish Scrap Metal Yard Here for U. S. Government

Impressed with the close connection with national defense expressed in the State Assembly's resolution calling on all cities and counties to conserve scrap iron and establish municipal yards for its collection by patriotic citizens, the city council decided Tuesday night to investigate possible locations for such a scrap center.

The State Assembly's recommendation pointed out that scrap iron should be conserved for possible use by the United States government and that citizens should be given opportunity of contributing to the supply in every California city.

Another "home defense" matter came to the attention of the council Tuesday night when City Clerk A. H. Bartlett read a communication from the American Legion Press Service. This reported that the Legion County Council had called on the sheriff, district attorney and police departments of the various cities to combat subversive influences and asked city councils to adopt ordinances forbidding trespassing on air fields, aircraft factory sites, tank farms, oil storage areas and water reservoirs.

On motion by Councilman Vern Babcock, the suggestion that the Torrance authorities draft and adopt a trespass ordinance, particularly aimed to protect oil and factory holdings here, was referred to the city ordinance committee.

Vital Utilities Thruout County Being Guarded

Precautions already are being taken to safeguard flood control dams, aqueducts, power lines and other vital spots in Los Angeles county against possible Fifth Column activities, it was stated today by Col. Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer for the board of supervisors, and in command of the 16th infantry of the National Guard.

Allen's statement was made to the board in answer to the suggestion from District Attorney Byron Fitts that closed areas be established around all dams and reservoirs, and that armed guards be placed around them to protect and to patrol them.

"Our own flood control district has watchmen constantly on duty at all large reservoirs and dams," Allen said. "While it is true that the present state of national affairs warrants constant vigilance to protect our common interests, investigation reveals that agencies in control of them have for some time been aware of the need of watchmen."
