The rates of per diem wages for each of the various classes of work shall be the hereinbefore-set forth prevailing rates of hourly wages multiplied by eight (8). Eight (8) hours shall constitute a day's work; it being understood that in the event that workmen are employed less than eight (8) hours per day, the per diem wages shall be deemed to be that fraction of the per diem wages herein established that the number of hours of employment bears to eight (8) hours.
The rates of overtime wages for each of the various classes of work shall be one and one-half times the prevailing hourly rates for each hour in excess of eight (8) hours worked on any one calendar day by any workman.
