Tax Revenue and Expenditures in State Show Gains

SACRAMENTO (U.P.) — Tax revenue of the state of California is nearly \$7,000,000 higher for the first 11 months of the 1939-40 fiscal year than for the same period of the previous year, the state department of finance reported this week.

Collections for the period July 1, 1939 to May 31, 1940 totaled \$169,257,767, while for the same months a year earlier the total was \$162,348,878.

During the same period, however, expenditures by the state government showed a greater increase and continued far ahead of revenues. The expenditure figures were \$191,222,096 for the 11 months of 1939-40 and \$179,956,836 for the 1938-39 period.

Job Training for CCC Enrollees is Approved

Two acts of legislation vital to the Civilian Conservation Corps became law last week with the signing of the appropriation bill, providing \$280,000,000 for the continuance of all 1,500 CCC companies in the United States.

The Byrnes Amendment also grants authority to train enrollees in such non-combatant skills as automotive repair and operation, road and bridge building, first aid, radio and photography, as part of regular CCC work and administration.

Plans have already been laid for the promotion of job training by Director James J. McEntee and his advisory council. These training plans are such as to provide trained men for non-combatant specific jobs on the defensive program, if needed, and incidentally to serve the enrollee well in equipping him for employment upon his return to his home community.

This plan is the finest opportunity ever presented to prospective CCC applicants, and it is expected that many young men not previously interested will file applications immediately for this July enrollment now in progress. The new eligibility requirements just passed, whereby a young man without dependents may enroll and have his earnings held for him until his six months enrollment has been completed will also attract many other young men hitherto ineligible.

Dayton E. Jones, state supervisor of selection, stated today that the July quota has not as yet been completed, and suggests that interested young men between the ages of 17 and 23½ get in touch with Clark Marshall, Los Angeles CCC selecting agent, at 701 East Jefferson boulevard.

More Land Added to Park System in California

SACRAMENTO (U.P.) — Approximately 10,000 acres of sequoia groves, canyons and forested mountain country have been added to the General Grant grove of Kings Canyon national park in California under a proclamation signed by President Roosevelt.

The new addition includes the Redwood mountain area, which was described as one of the finest remaining virgin groves of sequoia. The grove stands on a high ridge and is visible from all sides.

Kings Canyon national park will now include 464,000 acres.

Little Fishies to Get Diet of Horse Meat

SACRAMENTO. (U.P.) — The state division of fish and game is experimenting with the use of horse meat to feed fish at state hatcheries.

Ten thousand pounds of the meat was purchased for the experiment at seven cents a pound delivered to the hatcheries. The division formerly used liver, at a higher price.

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


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
