Test Polls Point to Victory for Mrs. Golden

Test polls taken by Golden-for-Congress volunteer workers in Torrance, Lomita and other parts of the 17th Congressional district during the last few days were said yesterday by Charles Mitschrich, Torrance committee chairman, to indicate that Mrs. Clara N. Golden will win the Democratic Congressional nomination by a comfortable margin at next Tuesday's primary election.

The poll, Mitschrich said, was conducted among representative groups of citizens—working men and women, business men, housewives, and employees and employees generally. The sentiment usually expressed, the chairman said, was that the incumbent Congressman had failed (in the words of former Assemblyman James J. Boyle) to "produce any tangible results for the benefit of the 17th district."

Comment was made on the "coincidence" of the incumbent Congressman flying from Washington, D. C., to be present in the district at the same time that Congressman Martin Dies, head of the House Committee investigating Communistic and un-American activities, arrived in Los Angeles to conduct an investigation.

It was recalled that Congressman Geyer, in a speech on the floor of the House, had attacked the Dies Committee as "seeking to terrorize the American people into a surrender of their traditional rights," and was one of only 21 to vote to discontinue the Committee's work, against 344 who voted for the Committee's continuance. Dies returned to Los Angeles yesterday to continue his investigation, but Geyer flew back to Washington on Monday.

Great Car Increase Means More Rigid Tests for Drivers

During the first six months of 1949 motor vehicle registrations in California increased 133,201 over the corresponding period in 1939, making a total of 2,732,936 vehicles of record in the state.

Because of the increasing number of automobiles on California highways the Department of Motor Vehicles has tightened up on the issuance of drivers' licenses. According to Director James M. Carter, 20,390 applicants, or more than 23 percent of those applying for licenses, were turned down during the month of June. In June, 1939, only 13.9 percent of the applicants failed to meet the requirements for a driver's license.
