"Relaxation" Courses at U.S.C. Night School Will Open on Sept. 16

Self-expression through the medium of crafts and hobbies is at the same time a healthful relaxation and an aid to the betterment of the quality of "bread-earning" work.

This, according to Dean W. Tieg, head of University College, evening division of the University of Southern California, has led the Trojan night school to expand its curriculum of "relaxation" courses for the fall term which will open Sept. 16.

"More than ever before, the American people are searching for something to take their minds off the troublesome times of the present," Dean Tieg stated. "So we are offering a series of courses that will provide fundamental training in a number of various hobbies, crafts and arts."

Outline of Courses: Late afternoon, evening and Saturday classes will be given in 48 different departments during the fall term which will run from Sept. 16 to Dec. 7 on the Trojan campus. Many of these courses carry college credit leading to university degrees.
