### Recreation Will Be Problem for Community Soon

Increased demand for recreation outlets will be a major problem to confront the Torrance Coordinating Council, says Mr. Burke of the County Council, when and if the population of this community sharply increases during the next year because of the national defense program.

Expansion of heavy metals plants here to take care of war orders with a corresponding boost in number of employees, will provide that problem and it is up to the local council to find ways and means to meet the new situation, he pointed out Monday night. Adequate housing will be one of the first considerations, with recreation facilities a corresponding issue among the new people who will be drawn into the community life.

Burke made a very timely talk, which should have been heard by more than the mere handful present at the Coordinator's session. Conflict of other social events Monday night prevented many from attending the first of a series of "town meetings" which will be a feature of the council's coming programs.

Other items of interest mentioned at the Monday night gathering were the donation of \$50 to the Torrance Community Chest, progress of the committee promoting establishment of a Boys' Club, and a report of the disbursement of funds for sending under-privileged children to camps last summer.
