

Fitts' Re-Election Is Forecast

Endorsed by men prominent in both major political parties, in non-partisan statements; by civic leaders from all parts of the county and by chiefs of police of 35 cities in the county, the re-election of Buron Fitts, as district attorney, next Tuesday was forecast this week by political seers.

Fitts' campaign, it was said at the Long Beach headquarters for south Los Angeles county, has won the admiration of those who, at its beginning, were neutral. Letters and telephone calls have poured into the office commending the false personal at-

tack on Fitts and lauding him for not entering into the personal "mud slinging" which has characterized the campaign against him.

The unsolicited endorsement of 35 chiefs of police from as many Los Angeles county cities, praising Fitts' conduct of the office of district attorney and pledging their aid for his re-election, drew comment from Harry Albert, chairman of the south Los Angeles County committee for Fitts, that "These men are activated only by their knowledge of Buron Fitts as an able law enforcement official. That they voluntarily pledged their support is mute testimony to the fact that Buron Fitts is the man the voters should return to the office next Tuesday."

Hauge's Work Held Benefit To Taxpayers

This is the second time the county tax rate has been cut since Dr. Hauge has been a member of the Board of Supervisors, Shellaby stated.

Deserves Re-Election
These tax reductions have come only through rigid budgetary control by the Board of Supervisors and have not impaired or eliminated any essential function of service. These reductions were also made in the face of mandatory increases for aid to the aged, blind and orphan aid.

It is no secret that the general trend of all governmental taxation is upward, further emphasizes the successful business management of the present Board, Shellaby said. All of which is a strong reason to retain Dr. Oscar Hauge as Supervisor in the fourth district at Tuesday's election, Shellaby pointed out with emphasis.



Recommendations On Propositions by Cal. Chamber

After consideration and study by its six regional Councils, its statewide taxation committee, and its Board of Directors, the California State Chamber of Commerce has issued the following recommendations concerning ballot propositions to be voted on at the election next Tuesday.

- Prop. 1—Releasing obligations, encumbrances and agreements taken as Security for State aid to aged persons. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 2—Release of encumbrances given as security for old age aid. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 3—Institutions for Felons. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 4—Election returns for governor and lieutenant governor. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 5—Daylight saving. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 6—Court review of acts of administrative officers, boards and commissions. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 7—Appellate courts. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 8—Fish and Game Commission. Recommendation, Yes.

- Prop. 10—Proceedings for public improvements or acquisition of property for public use. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 11—Permitting state to own shares in mutual water companies. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 12—Legislative committees. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 13—Sale or lease of state park lands containing oil or gas deposits. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 14—Apportionment of certain moneys to political subdivisions for local purposes. Recommendation, Yes.
- Prop. 15—Transfer of funds by city treasurer. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 16—Legislature, Budgets, Governor. Recommendation, No.
- Prop. 17—Personal liability insurance for officers, agents and employees of state and political subdivisions. Recommendation, No.

Daylight Saving Up for Sixth K. O. from Voters

A proposal that has been defeated once by popular vote and five times by vote of the state legislature appears again on the ballot Nov. 5. It is the so-called Daylight Saving act, a law to set ahead the clock by one hour during the summer months. Proponents argue that thus we will create an extra hour of daylight leisure for ourselves each year from May through September.

Daylight Saving was imposed on the nation by an act of congress during the 1917-18 war emergency in an attempt to con-

serve electric power. It was repealed promptly in 1919 after the emergency, because of its general unpopularity. California is one of the states in which it was least popular as witness the total failure of repeated attempts to re-establish it.

In 1930 when the proposal was on the ballot it was defeated by a ratio of more than 8 to 1. Nearly a million votes were cast against and only 317,890 in favor. Not one county in the state voted for Daylight Saving. Many counties rejected it by votes of 10 to 1.
