

Health Center Report Issued

That the County Health Center located at 2300 Carson street did a rushing business during the last fiscal year is evidenced by figures just released by the County Health Department's division of vital records.

A total of 4,724 individuals visited the health center clinics and conference rooms during the 12 months' period, making a total of more than 16,034 visits, or an average of 3.4 visits per year per individual.

R. G. Webster, chief statistician of the County Health Department, pointed out that of the total individuals attending clinics, 2,831 were new patients, making their initial call at the district health center.
