"Soul" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. The Golden Text is from the Psalmist: "Let all those that seek thee rejoice and be glad in thee and let such as love thy salvation say continually, Let God be magnified." One of the Scriptural citations includes these verses also from the Psalmist: "I love the LORD, because he hath heard my voice and my supplications. . . . Return unto my rest, O my soul; for the LORD hath dealt bountifully with thee. For thou hast delivered my soul from death, mine eyes from tears, and my feet from falling. I will walk before the LORD in the land of the living." These words from Isaiah are also presented: "Blessed be they that are joined together, ye waste places of Jerusalem; for the LORD hath comforted his people, he hath redeemed Jerusalem. . . . No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn. This is the heritage of the servants of the LORD; and their righteousness is of me, saith the LORD." Included in the Lesson-Sermon are these passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Life is the law of Soul, even the law of the spirit of Truth, and Soul is never without its representative." "Soul, or Spirit, is God, unchangeable and eternal; and man a coexistent with and reflects Soul, God, for man is God's image."

Local Mobilgas Man to Be Honored Tonight at Banquet in L.A.

Fred A. Harder of Torrance will be honored tonight when he will attend a General Petroleum banquet in Los Angeles and receive a clock presented by District Manager C. W. Christian in recognition of his 10 years' service in a Mobilgas station. He will be accompanied to the affair by W. C. Campbell, Torrance wholesale agent for the company, and his representative, Ted Coggins.

Star feature will be the formation of a Pegasus Club, to include about 150 high-ranking service station men of the metropolitan Los Angeles district. The ceremonies will be conducted by C. W. Coordinators Get Suggestions for Activities

Four suggestions for a program of activities were given members of the Torrance Coordinating Council last Friday evening by Mrs. Margaret Vandervort, who is connected with the Adult Education department of the Los Angeles Board of Education. Judge Robert Lesing, president of the council announced after her talk that the suggestions would be immediately adopted and carried out here.

Mrs. Vandervort's recommendations for broadening the sphere of the Council were: (1) A Traffic safety program in the high school where students would cooperate with the police department in a program of educating young drivers; (2) Place a premium on citizenship in the high school by various essays or speaking contests to obtain and disseminate new ideas for the purpose of improving citizenship ratings; (3) Develop interest in the Coordinating Council by presenting a series of "town hall" meetings or panel discussions—such as "What should be done in the Whittier state school case?" and (4) Urge local churches to extend their programs in order to make them "intellectually defensible, morally respectable every day in the week instead of just on Sundays, and socially applicable to all age groups."

Judge Lesing said that he is suggesting Mrs. Vandervort's recommendations be studied by various Coordinating Council committees, school authorities and church representatives with a view to adoption of them for a community program in Torrance.

Christian Mission Ending Tour With Eight-Day Conclave

Southern California will participate in a nation-wide movement to reemphasize Christian principles. The National Christian Mission, now on the last lap of an itinerary including 22 major American cities, will conclude its tour with an eight-day conclave centering in Los Angeles and six adjacent communities: Alhambra, Long Beach, Santa Monica, Pasadena, Glendale and Huntington Park. March 16-23 are the dates set.

Rallying to the challenge of destructive forces now undermining spiritual foundations of democracy, Christians throughout the United States are mobilizing for a demonstration of faith, seen as the answer to world ills. A team of 30 distinguished religious leaders drawn from all over the world will be brought to Southern California in connection with the Mission. Their function will be to conduct mass meetings, forums and seminars and fulfill speaking engagements. Dr. E. Stanley Jones, world famous missionary and author, will be a member of the team.

Sponsoring the event are the Church Federation of Los Angeles and the California Church Council, Southern Area. George L. Eastman, well known Los Angeles business man, is serving as general chairman. More than one hundred civic leaders in Los Angeles, as well as scores throughout Southern California, are cooperating with Eastman in making arrangements for the Mission.
