Tax Bill for California Families Said \$2 Per Day Next Year

"The tax bill in California next year will amount to \$2 per family for each and every day of the year, including Sundays and excluding national holidays," declared N. Bradford Trenham, executive secretary of California Taxpayers' association, discussing "The Tax Picture as it Looks From Here" at the Fourth Institute of Industrial Relations this week.

"This means that \$720 per family will be taken during the fiscal year in direct and hidden taxes to pay only a part of the cost of government, for the Treasury department has stated that it expects to pay through taxes for only two-thirds of its 19 billion dollar expenditure program next year," he stated, pointing out that this \$720 tax bill per family is well over half the average annual earnings of wage earners in manufacturing industries in the state in 1937, when they averaged \$1,288 per wage earner.

"In total, a \$1,400,000,000 tax bill will be presented to the people of California in 1941-42," Trenham continued, expanding his statement by pointing out that, in so far as cuts are made in non-defense Federal items and in state and local expenditure programs now being formulated for the coming year, the total could be reduced and the impact of the heavy burden of increased federal levies for national defense lessened.

Poultry Feeding Demonstration May 20 in Gardena

A thorough discussion of feeding chickens and turkeys for meat and egg production will be the feature of a meeting for poultrymen in southwest Los Angeles County, according to Charles Uhlky of Inglewood, chairman of the south county poultry discussion group.

The meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 20, in the Gardena Elementary school, 647 West Gardena Boulevard, Gardena. L. D. Sanborn, assistant farm advisor in Los Angeles county, representing the University of California, has recently received new feeding information from various state and government experiment stations, according to local poultrymen, and will present this information at the meeting.

County Airport Commission to Be Established

An advisory committee, rather than a separate county department, now is proposed to provide a satisfactory sponsoring group for any federal-aid airport projects that the government might desire to institute in unincorporated areas, it was learned this week at the Hall of Records.

The committee will have a status similar to that of the county's special assessment relief committee and the tax-delinquent lands committee. The county counsel is preparing an outline of the duties of the committee, or "commission" as it is proposed to call the group. It is proposed to have the same four county department heads make up the commission, with the chief engineer of the regional planning commission acting as chairman, instead of the county engineer as originally proposed. Heads of the mechanical and road departments are the other two committeemen. The matter is to come before the supervisors again on May 20.

Forest Camps for Problem Boys Proposed

Next Tuesday, May 20, has been set for a public hearing on a proposal to establish either through school districts or through the county government, forestry camps for problem boys between the ages of 13 and 15 years, it is announced by the board of supervisors.

Civic leaders headed by Courtney A. Teel appeared before the supervisors last week and urged a forestry camp for boys in their early teens, in place of sending them to a reform school. They would be assigned to carry on outdoor work, much like Boy Scout work.

Assembly Bill 1638, now before the State Legislature, would empower school districts to set up such camps and Supervisor John Anson Ford said he believes the problem of the younger bad boys is more of an educational than a police question and that 24-hour school camps may provide a better solution.

Cost of establishing a boys' forestry camp such as proposed by Teel, chairman of a juvenile court committee, would approximate \$70,000, including the first year's maintenance, it was estimated.

The county now maintains three forestry camps for boys from 16 to 19 years old where youths convicted of felony charges receive small wages for fire protection, road construction and other work. The great majority of these boys become good citizens following release from these camps, the supervisors have been told.
