

### New Series of U.S. Air Mail Stamps Issued

Announcement has been made by the Postal Department that a new series of air-mail stamps is shortly to be issued in several denominations to replace the stamps now in use. The new stamps will be of the same design, but each denomination will be printed in a separate and distinct color for identification purposes.

The first airmail stamp of the new series will be of the 6-cent denomination, and will be first placed on sale at the Washington, D. C. postoffice on June 25, 1941. The central subject of the stamp is a representation of a modern-type transport plane in flight which occupies the major portion of the space except that needed for the inscriptions.

Collectors desiring first-day covers should prepare same and forward to the Washington, D. C. postoffice in time for mailing on June 28th. A supply of the new stamps will reach the Torrance postoffice for sale to the public on June 28th according to Postmaster Q. Earl Conner.

The 10, 15, 20, 30 and 50 cent air-mail stamps will likewise be replaced with the new series, and the first days of issue will be announced later.

### Cooking With Your Refrigerator

You'll find hot-weather meal preparation lots easier if you will make your refrigerator an active partner of your range. Don't limit your refrigerator to the storing of foods until you are ready to prepare and cook them. Use your refrigerator, also, to store prepared dishes, ready to pop into your oven, or even ready to serve. By using your refrigerator in this way, many a preparation job can be done in the cool of the morning, or even the night before, helping you keep out of the hot kitchen for longer stretches at a time. Here are two menus that carry out this idea.

#### Sunday-Dinner Menu

- Jellied Consommé
- Baked Stuffed Fish
- Asparagus with Never-Fail Hollandaise Sauce
- Crisp Rolls
- Packaged Coffee Ice Cream and Raspberry Ice

This entire dinner can be prepared on Saturday. The consommé is chilled in the can; the stuffed fish is wrapped and put into the evaporator tray; the asparagus comes from the vegetable drawer; the sauce is stored in a jar; and the ice cream is kept in the freezing compartment at proper setting.

#### Baked Stuffed Fish

- 2 1/2-lb. fish, cleaned and trimmed but not split
- 2 c. water
- 4 tbsp. salt
- 4 tbsp. melted fat or mild oil
- 8 strips of bacon or fat

Let fish stand for 5 min. in water and salt, which have been mixed together. Drain. Cut three or four gashes through the skin on each side of the fish. Stuff the fish, using following recipe; close opening with toothpicks and string, or with needle and thread. Brush the skin thoroughly with melted fat or mild oil. Lay four strips of bacon in a shallow, greased baking pan 14" x 10" x 2 1/2", and place the fish on the bacon. Lay 2 more strips on top of each fish. Bake in hot oven of 500° F. for 15 min. Reduce the heat to moderately hot oven of 400° F. and bake 10 to 15 min. longer, or until fish is easily pierced with a fork. Lift fish carefully from pan onto a hot platter. Remove thread, toothpicks, garnish with slices of lemon, or tomatoes, or canned cranberry sauce, Serve 6.

#### Stuffing For Baked Fish

- 1 tsp. finely chopped onion
- 1/2 tsp. butter or margarine
- 1/2 tsp. dried bread cubes
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. cracked sage
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 tsp. dried dillweed
- 4 tbsp. water

Cook chopped onion slowly in butter until tender. Mix bread cubes, sage, salt, and pepper together; add cucumbers, water, onion, and butter; mix thoroughly with a fork. Cover and let stand for 5 to 10 min. Will stuff 2 1/2-lb. fish.

#### Help's-Day-Off Menu

- Sizzling Platter of Chopped-Meat Patties
- Sautéed Onions
- Hashed-Brown Potatoes
- Grapefruit Sections on Crisp Romaine
- Strawberry Chiffon Pie

All the dishes in this menu can be prepared early Thursday morning. The meat patties are stored in the meat keeper, and the onions, potatoes, and grapefruit sections are stored in covered bowls or refrigerator dishes. The pie does not need to be covered, because it is stored merely for chilling.

#### Strawberry Chiffon Pie

- 1 baked 9" pie shell
- 1 envelope white, unflavored gelatin
- 3/4 c. cold water
- 4 eggs, separated
- 3/4 c. granulated sugar
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 c. crushed strawberries
- 2 or 3 drops red coloring
- 1/2 pt. heavy cream
- 5 tbsp. granulated sugar

Soak gelatin in cold water about 5 min. Beat egg yolks slightly, and add 1/2 c. sugar, lemon juice, and salt. Cook over boiling water until of custard consistency. Add the softened gelatin, stirring thoroughly. Add strawberries and coloring. Cool, and when mixture begins to congeal, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, to which has been added remaining 1/2 c. sugar. Fill baked pie shell, and chill. Just before serving, spread the pie with the cream, whipped and sweetened with the 5 tbsp. sugar. Garnish with strawberries if you wish.

### Trailer Camps Meet Defense Housing Needs

LOS ANGELES—(U.P.)—Federal authorities now believe that a perambulating home, the automobile trailer, may be the answer to the problem of housing national defense workers in many sections of the country.

Having easily overcome the two primary wants of man, food and clothing, national defense leaders have had to cope with the question of providing shelter for hundreds of thousands of persons who have been transplanted from their homes to work on defense projects.

Using Southern California as a testing ground in solving the housing problem authorities recently concluded that the trailer is at least an excellent temporary solution.

Workers are Transients. The question of sheltering the necessary workers arose when investors and contractors shied away from building low cost houses to accommodate transient workers, fearing ghost towns would be created at the end of the emergency when the men returned to their homes.

And, although under the Federal Housing Administration's Title VI plan some homes were constructed, many workers in defense centers found themselves well-paid but homeless.

So the automobile trailer entered the picture and thousands of the two-wheeled bungalows are serving as comfortable lodgings for the men and their families.
