

COUNCIL SESSION STRICTLY BUSINESS AFTER 5 MONTHS OF POLITICAL "FIREWORKS"

(Continued from Preced. Page) "look into who will stand the cost of a cleanup."

NEW LAW STUDIED . . . Asked for a report on the status of the house at 1518 1/2 Crenshaw blvd., which was damaged by fire, subsequently condemned by the council as unfit for human habitation and the object of a petition signed by 17 residents in the neighborhood which urged the council Aug. 28 to take some definite action on the structure, City Attorney McCall said a new state law, effective last Saturday, applies to the building. He reported he was having copies of this measure, whose terms were not detailed, made for study by each member of the council and said he would be able to give an opinion at the next meeting.

ORDINANCE UNDER FIRE . . . Attorney McCall had no recommendation to make regarding changes in Sec. 2 of Ordinance No. 275, which will get a test by a jury in Judge Shidler's court tomorrow with an employee of Sam Levy as defendant. He said the measure, which prohibits loading or unloading across a sidewalk of any size wares or merchandise, should be investigated by the council as a whole. No action was taken.

NO CABILLO PROGRESS . . . In response to a question on the progress toward acquisition of the Cabillo ave., P. E. right-of-way, asked by Councilman Babcock, City Attorney McCall said he knew nothing of the matter, that it was in the hands of City Engineer Glenn Jain who is now on his vacation. The Interstate Commerce Commission must approve abandonment of the right-of-way purchased months ago by the city, before Torrance can proceed to remove the rails and wires (at the city's expense) and pave the strip from Torrance blvd. to Plaza del Amo.

OKAY PUMP WORK . . . The Pomona Pump Co. was authorized to proceed with installation of the electrical setup for the city's new well in North Torrance.

REPAIRS AUTHORIZED . . . Damaged that night (Thursday) one of the police patrol cars was certified for repairs costing approximately \$170.

NO PALMISTRY PERMIT . . . On recommendation of Police Chief Stroh, who said the applicant "doesn't care very much whether she gets a Torrance permit or not", no license was granted Mrs. Lola Adams, Los Angeles gypsy, to practice palmistry here.

LOG COST QUOTED . . . If Mrs. Phoebe R. Barnes of 1221 El Prado wishes to obtain the material from the city for a small log cabin home it will cost her the usual price of \$12 per cent for eucalyptus logs, the council ruled in response to her request for a price quotation.
