


### Where Daredevil Was Marooned on 'Sky Island'

### LOS ANGELES MAPS PROGRAM FOR TRAFFIC



**SUPER-HIGHWAY** developments for Los Angeles are now before City Council. This map shows completed parkways and others under way or provided for. They are: 1, Arroyo Seco Parkway, Glen Arm street (Pasadena) to Avenue 22; 2, Hollywood Parkway (Cahuenga Freeway), Highland avenue to 900' North of Barham boulevard; 3, Arroyo Seco Parkway, Avenue 22 to Figueroa Terrace; 4, Hollywood Parkway, 900' North of Barham boulevard to 1000' North of Lankershim boulevard; 5, Aliso street viaduct (sponsor's allocation) (junction of Ramona and Santa Ana Parkways); 6, Santa Ana Parkway, Aliso street to Solo street; 7, Ramona Parkway, Aliso street to City Limits; 8, Santa Monica Parkway, Alameda street to Vermont avenue; 9, Sepulveda Parkway, Sunset boulevard to Pico boulevard; 10, Ramona Parkway, Los Angeles to Pomona; 11, Santa Ana Parkway (portions); 12, Sepulveda Parkway, Jefferson boulevard to Caticinella boulevard.

### Rainfall Data Being Compiled

Nearly 100 cities, water companies and other public and private agencies cooperate with the Los Angeles county flood control district in supplying figures on rainfall and other hydrologic information.

This cooperation enables the district to keep up-to-the-minute records without being compelled to employ a large staff to collect the information. In return for this data, the district furnishes each organization with copies of all reports thus compiled.

Main purpose in acquiring this information is to guide flood control engineers in impounding and releasing water from various dams and other control structures so as to assist ranchers in dry seasons and yet not impound needlessly, during storm water periods.

### Subdivision Work Pressed Here

Despite the stalemate blocking improvement of Cabrillo ave. and Torrance biva., other municipal betterments are making progress. City Engineer Glenn Jain reports that improvements in the first defense-spurred housing subdivision here are 50 per cent complete.

Jain said city crews have surfaced three dedicated but unimproved streets in the subdivision southeast of Arlington and Plaza del Amo, near the city park, and shortly would start on three remaining.

The developers, A. J. Katz and L. K. Pine of Los Angeles have expended approximately \$9,000 in pouring curbs and gutters for the 72-home project, known as "Park Knoll." Jain said. Ten homes are now under way there.

Families of workers newly employed in the defense expanding Columbia Steel and National Supply Co. plants are expected to occupy a majority of the new homes.

### Golden State Children Are Tops in U. S.

**BERKELEY** — Results of body measurements of 147,000 children from all major geographical divisions of the United States show that California children are on the whole taller and heavier than children in other areas.

This is shown in a study of the Bureau of Home Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with the cooperation of research centers in 15 states. The study in California was conducted by Dr. Harold E. Jones, director of the University of California's Institute of Child Welfare.

The ages covered in the study were from six through 14 years. From the age of seven, California boys proved to be taller and heavier than boys of any of the other states. The difference seems to be one which increases with age; thus, at six years the California boys were on the average slightly lighter than the boys measured in Illinois; at seven years they were slightly heavier, at ten years five pounds heavier, and at 14 years ten pounds heavier.

The same is true of height; at fourteen years the California boys were on the average one inch taller than the average for the second ranking state. As compared with the entire group of boys measured, California boys of a given age were approximately as tall as the national average for boys six months older. At nearly all ages, California boys also ranked first in such measurements as chest girth and upper arm girth.
