Special Classes For Defense At Cal-Tech Told

To help meet increased needs for trained personnel in defense industries, the California Institute of Technology is scheduling three tuition-free courses in the field of electrical engineering and two in aeronautics. These courses will meet evenings, beginning about the middle of January, for a period of ten or twelve weeks.
THEORY AND SCIENCE OF ELECTRIC WELDING: Designed to give a knowledge of the fundamentals of resistance welding and welding metallurgy, rather than the vocational practice and technique or the training of welders.
ELECTRICAL MACHINERY: Provides class and laboratory training related to direct and alternating current machinery and protective devices.
ELECTRONIC CIRCUITS and APPARATUS: Provides training, primarily for engineers now employed, who may be called upon for knowledge of radio and electronics.
AIRCRAFT DESCRIPTIVE GEOMETRY: Provides training for aircraft detailers and others interested in the application of descriptive geometry to aircraft structures.
INTRODUCTION TO AERODYNAMICS: Designed to give men in design, layout, and construction departments of aircraft companies a comprehension of the fundamentals of aerodynamics as these affect aircraft design.

Don't Let Those Japs Chase You Under the Bed

The first impact of war, with its blackouts and grim civilian defense preparations, seems to have jarred the imaginations of some Californians out of true perspective. Civilian activities certainly must not be permitted to hamper defense. But real harm may result to public morale from unnecessary, panicky upsets in normal affairs.
 An example of prudent interference with civilian activities was the cancellation of the Rose Bowl and San Francisco Shrine football games. Army leaders believed it dangerous to permit such large concentrations of civilians, known in advance to the enemy. Sport fans accepted the necessary cancellations cheerfully enough.
 But an entirely different example was set last week when a group of excited San Franciscans called off a \$5000 open golf tournament. Chiding these gentlemen, an Irish sports writer named Prescott Sullivan wrote: "Keep things going and our town will be better for it. Don't want people to think the Japs have chased you under the beds, do you?" Meanwhile the city of Oakland continued a golf tournament with the announcement: "We will be guided by the belief that by conducting our affairs in a normal manner we are aiding rather than interfering with civilian morale."
 Why not, after all, try to maintain reasonable normalcy this winter, going the places we like to go and doing the things we most enjoy? We'll all find the same snow in the grand, silent mountains, fish in the streams, sunlight on the hiking trails. The stores sell cards and games and books for blackout evenings — and all manner of recreational equipment for the out-of-doors.
 Play golf! Take in shows! Take planned trips! Have parties! Military needs come first, of course. But let's let the world know the Japs can't chase us under the beds. Let's have fun in California!
