**Federal Income
Tax Returns
Now Available**

Personal income tax returns for 1941 were released to the public Monday. Copies of forms 1040 and 1040A were mailed to all taxpayers in Southern California who filed income tax returns for 1940.

All single persons whose total income was \$750 during 1941 are required to file tax returns on either of these forms not later than March 15. Residents of the ten Southern California counties may secure copies of the 1941 income tax forms at any of the Internal Revenue offices. Collector Nat Rogan warned all taxpayers that failure to receive a form in the mail from the Revenue Department does not relieve them from the responsibility of filing returns. Those persons who do not receive their forms in the mail, should contact the Revenue office immediately to obtain copies. No forms may be secured from post offices or from banks.

Individuals whose total income in 1941 was \$3,000 or less, and which was derived solely from salaries, wages, rents, annuities or royalties, may use form 1040A, the new simplified tax form issued this year for the first time. All persons whose total income in 1941 was more than \$3,000 or was derived from the operation of a business or from the sale of stocks, bonds, real estate, or other capital assets, must use form 1040. Taxes may be paid in full, semi-annual, or in quarterly installments; by personal check, cash, or with United States Treasury tax saving notes. At least one-fourth of the tax must be paid when the return is filed.

**REGISTRATION OF MEN
ON THIRD "R" DAY
WILL BE GRADUAL**

entire district was announced as 3,060.

On July 1, 1941 the second "R" day was held for registration of men who became 21 years old since the first registration. A total of 155 young men signed up in the district covered by Board No. 280 - 86 in Torrance, 32 in Lomita, and 37 in Gardena.

Classification of the men who enroll on the coming third "R" day will be made by local boards. Washington officials said it has not yet been decided whether new legislation will be needed to draft men not of military age for defense services.

Meanwhile, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson has announced the War Department has decided not to abandon voluntary enlistments for the Army. A few weeks ago, the War Department

said voluntary enlistments would be halted as soon as the wave of "patriotic" enlistments that followed the Pearl Harbor attack subsided and that it would rely on Selective Service for manpower.

Stimson said the War Department's new decision was based on "recent legislation and after review of the present situation." The age limit for initial enlistments will be from 18 to 35 years. The recently-enacted manpower registration act excluded men of 18 and 19 from the military service draft but permitted them to volunteer.

Simultaneously, the War Department authorized the recall to active duty of all enlisted reservists by Feb. 1, 1942. These included members of the enlisted Reserve Corps, the Regular Army Reserve and the National Guard on inactive status.
