Fern P.T.A. Now Feeding Lunches to 50 Children

Launching a hot lunch program designed to build up undernourished youngsters, the Fern Avenue P. T. A. this week began serving lunches to about 50 children.

Each child pays 13 cents for his cup and furnishes his own spoon. No charge is made for the meals but any child may donate to a fund from which the P. T. A. unit purchases sugar, cocoa, sugar, salt and such foods not obtained from the F. S. C. The program will continue twice weekly until enough volunteers make it possible to start daily lunches.

Mmes. George Grabtree and Mildred Kerr, room mothers assisted by the unit's president, Mrs. John Garner, arranged the first trial of the project. Twelve women are now working and 25 are needed, Mrs. Garner said.
