

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Contract Let For 400-Unit Housing in H. C.

Award of the general construction work on a 400-unit housing project in Harbor City was given William C. Crowell of Los Angeles for his bid of \$997,000. It was reported yesterday. Site improvements and utilities installations were covered by a \$197,698 contract given Thomas A. Boyer Corp., and J. K. Thomas of Los Angeles. No date is specified for start of construction.
The Harbor City units are for families of Fort MacArthur personnel and the Army's civilian employees. The Los Angeles city housing authority, which acted as the Federal government's agent in calling for bids, announced the project will be rushed.
