FORESEES NEED OF MACHINES WOMEN CAN MANAGE

LOS ANGELES. - "Another new strong line of defense is growing the length and breadth of the country. If the day comes when large numbers of factory workmen join the colors, their places will be freshly filled from the universities, colleges and schools of America," says Thomas A. Watson, associate in mechanic arts at the Los Angeles campus of the University of California.

"The expansion of the airplane industry and new designs call for a vast project of re-tooling," adds Watson. "Time is a tremendous factor. Thousands of skilled mechanics are needed. Tomorrow, high speed assembly lines may require tools which women can manage."

"With such vast numbers of planes on order, even yet some factories cling to outmoded tooling adequate only for the tailor-made era of manufacturing, when a contract for ten or twenty planes was considered huge."

As supervisor of tool engineering classes, Watson declares the shift to tooling for mass production can double the output without a large increase in plant space.




