Named on Price Adjustment Board by War Department

Colonel Wayne R. Allen, Los Angeles county's chief administrative officer and purchasing agent on leave of absence for the duration, was appointed as one of seven members of the War Department Price Adjustment Board immediately following his recent induction into Army services, Army officials announced this week. At the same time Colonel Allen was appointed Assistant Chief of the Purchases Branch, Procurement and Distribution Division by A. J. Browning, chief of the branch. As member of the War Department Price Adjustment Board, Colonel Allen will be the only Army executive on the board, his six colleagues having been drafted from civilian life to aid the War Department in reviewing past and future prices and profits on all war contracts. The new board is designed to speed up war production and eliminate excessive profits. Vehicles in public health and security services are given first preference in the rationing of tires in Cuba.

Throw Out That Throw-Rug!
Blackout Advice by Red Cross Has Timely Tips for Residents
Put your house in order if you would avoid barked shins, stubbed toes or more serious injury during blackouts. This timely advice is contained in an article by Helen Keating Neal, assistant to the director, American Red Cross Home Accident Prevention Service, in the April issue of the Red Cross Courier from Washington. Miss Neal warns that blackouts mean new home hazards and that falls and fires are likely to be on the increase for the duration. Stairways, cellars and attics should be cleared of papers, discarded furniture and other waste matter. Cleaning them out serves a double purpose—it reduces a fire menace and contributes much needed materials to the war effort. "People living in coastal areas face the possibility of air raids," writes Miss Neal. "Experts believe the incendiary bomb is the type the enemy is most likely to drop on us. During blackouts it will be difficult for fire departments to make their usual speed in getting to a fire and during a combination air raid and blackout many individuals will have to be their own fire department. Fire prevention is, therefore, one of the most important factors in civilian defense." "One of the greatest menaces in the American home in time of peace or war is the appropriately named throw rug. It is safe enough if you take it in slow stride but if the sharp warning of an air raid warden
