### County Government Per Capita Cost Is 8th Lowest In State

Los Angeles county, with a per capita expenditure of \$27.12 for general county government purposes in 1940-41, ranked eighth from the lowest among the 57 counties of the state, according to a study of per capita expenditures for county government, made public this week

by California Taxpayers' association. These expenditures include subventions and grants received by the county government. In 1935-36, when the county spent \$17.83 per capita, the county's rank among the counties was 14th from the lowest, the association stated. Expenditures by the county governments throughout the state averaged \$29.23 in 1940-41, compared with a state-wide average of \$18.70 for 1935-36, an increase of \$10.53 per capita,

### Bonelli Drafted For Second Term On State Board

Deluging him with resolutions praising his integrity, impartiality and ability, William G. Bonelli, member from the Fourth District on the State Board of Equalization for the past four years, was practically "drafted" this week to seek office for another four year term by a group of outstanding organizations.

President Byron C. Hanna of the Southern California Business Men's Assoc., read and presented the first resolution, which was followed by similar testimonials from the Southern California Hotel Association, Southern California Retail Grocers' Association; Southern California Restaurant Association, Southern California Druggists' Association.

President Hanna pointed out that the Board of Equalization collects more than \$200,000,000 a year in state revenues or more than 30 per cent of the grand total. Bonelli expressed his appreciation and announced his desire to serve for another term, indicating appreciation of the cooperation that business men in all industries had given his office during the past four years.

### Rabies Cases On Increase

There have been nearly nine times as many cases of animal rabies reported during the first five months of 1942 as were reported during the entire year of 1941 and 1940, according to Dr. W. L. Halverson, county health officer.

Nine cases were reported for the week ending May 23, bringing the total for the year to date to 160. Complete reports require about two weeks to come thru and be compiled.

### Cross-Filing, Buttons and Poll Results of State Political Scene

Governor Olson's indignant condemnation of candidates who cross-file and run on more than one ticket (his name this year will appear only on the Democratic ballot) brought smiles to politicians with sharp memories. Reason: In 1938, Olson cross-filed himself, seeking both the Democratic and Progressive nominations for Governor. He lost the Progressive nomination to Ray Haight, but won at the final.

### Why Army and Navy Does Not Finance U.S.O.

Although United Service Organizations is a government-sponsored agency, it must depend upon the generosity of civilians, not upon government financing, for its resources. The point, paradoxical to many contributors, was today clarified by A. J. Gook, state campaign chairman, in discussing the vital need for generous contributions to the \$32,000,000 USO War Fund goal.

Gook prefaced his comment with the observation that the question is often asked: "If the USO program is for soldiers, sailors and marines, why doesn't the Army and Navy finance it?"

"The question," he remarked, "may seem at first glance a fair one, but in the answer we discover the basic value of the war—democracy versus Nazism and Fascism.

"The issue is whether or not the state shall be subservient to the people or the people to the state. Ours is the democratic theory, the other is oligarchic and anti-American.

No Military Anteroom. "USO confines its activities to the recreational, social and spiritual needs of the armed forces on leave, off the reservation and while relaxing after front line fighting. It is in these intervals that the service man finds not only physical and mental respite but a confirmation of the democratic promise that he is a free individual with certain inalienable rights and privileges.

"If the Army and Navy were to assume control of the leisure of our service men as well as their duty time, our boys would be in the same boat as Axis soldiers and sailors, subject to military autocracy. The financing of a program such as USO's by the military would be, in effect, state control, a breaking down of all the principles for which our men are fighting this war," Gook pointed out.

### Theatres to Aid Pledge Drive For War Bonds

Each manager has offered to install a booth in the outer lobby of his theatre Friday, Saturday and Sunday. At each theatre will be found volunteer workers who will accept war bond pledges from anyone who has been missed in the general campaign. It will not be necessary to purchase a ticket for the evening's show to "Sign with Sam." The booths will be in the outer lobby in each case, immediately off the street.

Your neighborhood theater will act as a Minute Monument and be your last chance to sign up in this drive. The Treasury Department's Blue Sticker in your window, indicating that you have pledged to buy Bonds and Stamps, is a badge of patriotism. Everyone should have it in their window.
